

Throughout the evening, I listened and watched in delight, sometimes in awe, as students ascended the stage to receive their awards and others to display their dramatic and musical talents. The band music teacher Marnie Tiggemann put together via facebook postings, bringing Old Scholars over the past ten years back together for a one night stand, was really something! So, too, was the blessing for the 2010 Indian Pilgrims and, at the Junior School night, the choir and dramatic representation of life and learning in the new sustainable garden program.

What does excellence mean? One definition says it's 'a talent or quality which is unusually good and so surpasses ordinary standards; also a standard to aim for, it cannot be achieved without commitment and practice'. Another, that it means 'possessing good qualities in high degree' and, yet another, that excellence is the practice that underpins the search for happiness and the sense of fulfilment that comes from a life well lived.

Shamelessly searching the web for more thoughts about the connection between excellence and happiness, the following really rang a bell:

The pursuit of happiness is the ultimate goal for most people. I believe that the pursuit of personal excellence is one key to reaching that goal. Personal excellence is achieved by continuously practicing your talents in your life and in your work. Simply put to always be the best that you can be at everything you do.

The pursuit of personal excellence in your life and in your work is what Aristotle refers to as 'doing and living well'. To be happy one must excel in their life and in their work. It is the desire to reach your full potential in life that gives you the passion and ambition needed to succeed at whatever you do.

So while it is important and right to celebrate pinnacle awards like Dux, Subject, Sport and Christian Leadership Awards it is just as important, as Head of Junior School Larry Spry said, to recognise and value the many examples of excellence that occur in day-to-day contexts such as the classroom, school yard, on camps, down the street and on the bus

Our outgoing Headmaster made a similar point in one of his last newsletters, when he wrote:

'In the end, receiving an award is not the point, it is whether each boy has done his best in 2010 that really counts. We try to recognise, and we certainly promote personal excellence, so to all in this category, whether presented on stage or not, may the motto of Rostrevor (Palma Merenti) resonate strongly in their hearts'.

And then there is this from respected American educator and author Leo Buscaglia:

'We will have been only half educated unless we have acquired a sense of

human dignity and worth, an appreciation of life, the ability to give and receive love, the knowledge of how to use our limited time wisely, and the determination to leave the world a better place for our having been in it'.

Reflecting on his formal education experiences some years ago, Australian cartoonist Michael Leunig confessed that he had failed his Year 12 exams not once, but twice. Never a 'lazy, difficult or disruptive student', he left 'bewildered as ever' with little to show for 13 years of struggle – 'no sporting trophies, no certificates or glowing reports – no achievements – just a few mates, a few memories – and, miraculously, a soul that still yearned for an intelligent life'.

In trying to make sense of why it was that he never really suited school, and school never really suited him Leunig, too, presents education excellence as but one measure of achievement in life:

Education excellence or not, intelligence suits us all, and intelligence may be just

another word for sensitivity as far as I can understand. You have to grow it whenever and wherever you can and sometimes you have to survive an education system, an academy or any web of convention, authority or conformity to do it. Life's a long time and that's the achievement, that's what matters in the end – to come through, not necessarily with excellence and brilliance, but with soul.

Postscript: When our 2010 Year 12 graduates were asked to nominate some personal highlights over the past couple of years, it would come as no surprise that many said the College formals. What might surprise, is that many also (or instead) said their retreat experiences.

Excellent Educators

In 2008, history teacher Tim Hart received a national Inspirational Teacher Award and now Head of Physical Education Glen Urbani has similarly

One of 60 teachers recognised nationally in 2010, including eight from South Australia, Glen was the only secondary teacher to be awarded in South Australia and the only one from a non-government (Catholic or Independent) school. Congratulations to Glen – described in the award citation as a powerful role model for young boys – on this significant achievement. (See page 15)

From the Principal



Mr Simon Dash – Principal Rostrevor College

Being new to the Rostrevor community, I can honestly report that my first impressions have been wonderful. I knew Rostrevor College only by its reputation as a leading school in boys' education with a tradition of excellence in all facets of schooling life. The campus is impressive and everyone I have met in Adelaide from taxi drivers to shop attendants have referred to the College as a great school. But that is only a small part of the story of my first impressions. The friendliness of staff, students, parents and board members and the great spirit of welcome were quite overwhelming. It underlined for me that Rostrevor College is much more than a school. I

was being welcomed into the Rostrevor family. It is good to know that regardless of your location, when you walk into a Catholic School in the Edmund Rice tradition people come first.

My wife, Clare, and our four children made the trek down with me from Central Queensland in time to enjoy an Adelaide new year. My son has now returned to Brisbane to commence his studies and take up a position with a Law firm. After the helter-skelter busyness of unpacking we had a few days to explore this beautiful city. Each experience reinforced to us that the decision to move to South Australia was the right one.

My previous posting was as Principal of St Brendan's College, Yeppoon, a position that I filled for seven years. St Brendan's is also a Catholic School in the Edmund Rice tradition with 300 boarders and 350 local students. While the location, topography and demographics of St Brendan's and Rostrevor may be very different, it is very clear already that the hopes and aspirations of these two communities have much in common. Students, parents, staff and Old Scholars of these communities desire excellence in education, respect for the dignity and

contribution of every individual, a firm yet compassionate approach to discipline and a spirit of faith and service to underpin all endeavours. In short we desire the students of Rostrevor College to grow to maturity as 'men of faith and learning'.

Rostrevor College has everything that is needed to provide the foundations for a successful life. But, I am convinced that it offers something of even greater importance: the foundations for a significant life. The College has a proud record of producing graduates who have achieved great success in their chosen fields of endeavour and, no doubt, will continue to do so for generations to come. But, success in these terms is only a small fraction of the Rostrevor legacy. Be they Doctors, Lawyers, Engineers, Business Leaders, Social Workers or Tradesmen, I believe the graduates of this College are inspired by a faith-filled purpose to make a difference to the world. For some this may come through major contributions to establishing equity and justice in our nation and beyond our borders. For others it is simply being actively involved in the local community and conducting their affairs in an ethical manner. This is the kind of significant life to which I refer and

Rostrevor's greatest legacy. Through the provision of a well-rounded education, and in partnership with parents, the young men of this College will continue the tradition of being 'men for others'.

The opportunity to lead the Rostrevor family is exciting, particularly at this time of renewal and growth. Rostrevor College is built on a dream that became a reality through the toil and dedication of generations of good people. People like Brother Purton and Brother Hanrahan who toiled many years to gain permission for the founding of this great school in 1923. It is good to recall the words from the 1924 Annual which paid tribute to Brother Purton:

"Under his able direction and management the dream of years became a reality. The confined and undesirable surroundings of city life became a thing of the past. An open hilly country, with unsurpassed landscape embracing land and sea, took their place. The nerve-shattering noise of city traffic was no more. Only the song of the blackbird or the musical chattering of the magpies delights the ear in the surroundings of Rostrevor."

- by a commitment to community; to live our call to supportive


- relationships and to truly celebrate our diversity;





Farewell Mr Jeff Croser

Jeff Croser began at Rostrevor in 2003 as Rostrevor's first lay Headmaster. He wrote in his opening article in the Rostrevor magazine that "when things feel right, I believe that it is God's way of letting us know that our life's journey is in harmony with God's dream for the world." This marked the sense of faith which he brought to the job.

Many important initiatives occurred in his time as Head. He encouraged Whole School masses to be held in the Purton Hall rather than bussing the boys to a large local church. This worked well as the money formally spent on buses now goes into lighting and sound. A mural was commissioned for the resource centre which told the story of the links between CBC and Rostrevor. International students were introduced to the school in greater numbers partly to enrich the environment culturally and to enhance the adaptive education resources with the money that their fees brought in.

The Science Centre was built after the planning had commenced under Br Dean McGlaughlin's guidance. The Christian Brothers' Commemorative Garden was opened in 2005 on Edmund Rice Day. The Environment Centre opened and began to educate our boys as well as visitors from other schools about native animals and Morialta Park. Perhaps the most daring and exciting initiative was the formation of the Rostrevor Indigenous Sporting Academy. This offered adolescent boys 'a sporting chance' to gain a Year Twelve SACE certificate. The old Senior Science building was renovated and re-opened as the Br Brian Clery Skills centre.

Perhaps Jeff's main contribution was his leadership style which was relational in approach. He was open to consulting staff and parents and listening before making key decisions. He was a regular attendee at the sporting and other co-curricular events that the boys took part in and genuinely rejoiced at their successes and endeavours. He trusted the senior leadership team and used their expertise very well. He had been a Principal and Head of three schools Cardijn, Cabra and then Rostrevor, so it was no surprise that he decided to move to a new phase in his life. We wish him well as the EREA regional coordinator for NSW.

Congratulations Mr Glen Urbani

Mr Glen Urbani, staff member at Rostrevor since 1994, was awarded a NEiTA (National Excellence in Teaching Award) as national recognition for his role as an Inspirational Teacher in the 2010 Awards. A Powerful Role Model for Young Boys Rostrevor College is a Catholic Day and Boarding school for boys, located in Woodforde, an Adelaide suburb. The College has over 1100 students from Reception to Year 12. Many students come from disadvantaged backgrounds including refugees and remote and regional Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australians. Glen Urbani is the Faculty Head of Physical Education and has taught Health Education, Physical Education and Personal Learning Plan classes at the school for 17 years.

Glen implements holistic learning activities that develop physiological, sociological and psychological skills. Based on each student's individual abilities, Glen extends their fitness, problem solving and communication skills. He coaches various sporting teams and mentors other staff, student teachers and students.

He has been a member of committees and sub-groups responsible for the development and implementation of curriculum at Senior School levels for the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) Board of South Australia in both Health and Physical Education for well over 20 years.

Sharing his passion for volleyball with students, Glen has coached numerous volleyball teams with several winning state and national competitions. His students have been accepted into the Australian Institute of Sport and represented Australia at Olympic level.

Glen believes that an important part of a healthy sporting life is giving back to the community and he encourages this in his students. His Year 12 class has assisted as role models and coaches at the Indigenous Games Day at a disadvantaged local primary school. His Year 9 class have helped run a Special Olympics event for local handicapped young people.

Glen successfully motivates his students to do their best and to help others

because he models this same behaviour himself. With 32 years of teaching experience, he is still constantly updating his pedagogical methods and employing new technologies. Glen's passion, enthusiasm, commitment, and interest in his students make him a powerful role model for the students of Rostrevor College.



Some of those reflections are presented here.


Michael Colagrossi – Head Prefect 2001







James Murray - Platinum Jubilee

I was the fifth son of a family of six boys. I have now moved up to the second son which is rather disturbing. I came from a no religion family so it was surprising when I tried in vain to join the Brothers in 1940 as a Year 9 student. However in December of that year I received the sacraments of Baptism, Penance, Holy Communion and Confirmation and packed my bags with my Mother's assistance and set out with Walter Godfrey Hall, Barry Robinson and Leo Leunig for the Juniorate in Strathfield New South Wales, with my father's assurance that I would be home within a fortnight.

I spent three years in St Enda's under the direction of Brothers Borgia Murray, Claver Daly, Paschal Kent and Alban McKay. My Novitiate Year was under the direction of Br Patrick Harty in 1944 after which it was back to Strathfield for a brief year trying to discover how to teach. My first experience was a fortnight at Burwood with a class of 29 students. I survived. It was now down to business where I spent two years at St Joseph's Newtown. The Abbott was Br De Sales Delahunty. From there I was moved to Edgecliff where I had two classes Grade 4 (48 students) and Grade 5

My final three years in Sydney (1949-1951) were at Manly where I had my largest class of 83 students! It was here that I lived with Tony Dally, Declan Kerr, Sebastian Crohan and other Brothers. I was invited to teach Chemistry. My Final Profession took place at the end of 1951 after which I returned to WA for the first time since I left home in 1941. From the east coast to the west coast I flew. Geraldton was my first port of call where I was stationed for two years before returning to Perth where I met up with Br Pius O'Driscoll and later Br Celsus Williams. The classes were not quite as large as in Manly with 67 in Grade 4, 75 in Grade 6 and 77 in Grade 6 in 1956.

The classes were smaller at Castledare Boys Home were I spent six years but life was not easier as there were two large dormitories as well as sport and dining room supervisions. It was here that I discovered how to drive buses and trucks and screen films. It was non-stop action with Br Patrick O'Doherty and Salvius Marques.

From 1963 until 1972, I was in Kalgoorlie working in the primary department until 1972 when I was promoted to a First Year Class. Br Sebastian Quilligan and Br Bernard Titus Murphy were two memorable Superiors in those far off days.

My final two and a half years in the West were spent at St Mark's College, in Bedford. Here I oscillated between primary and secondary classes. After a six months religious course in Rome I was informed that my next work would be in Fremantle. Of course, despite assurances, I did not believe it would happen. On the way back from the Perth Airport, Br Peter Negus informed me that I had been changed to Adelaide as the Junior Headmaster. The Teaching Staff included Colleen Colquhoun, Judy Barnett (RIP), Con Brauer and Br Russell O'Brien. My first year there was a worry but after that they were my happiest years of teaching. By 1994 I was edging on to 70 years. The Principal, Br John Marks (RIP) was due to retire so it was appropriate to hand over the chalks and blackboard dusters to younger ones.

Now in retirement it is time to relax, go shopping for the Community, tidying up the house and of course up grading my stamp collections.

My sincere thanks are extended to the organisers of my Platinum Jublilee.

Trevor Gibbons - Diamond Jubilee

Born in Port Elliot in 1936, I was educated at Ellengowan Primary (St Peters) and CBC, Wakefield St.

At 14 years of age I moved to the Sydney Juniorate to complete secondary school and novitiate as a Brother. After majoring in Physics at Melbourne University I have taught science most of my life, at times along with school administration (Warrnambool, Ballarat, Rostrevor, Geraldton).

Deeply moved by a talk by South American Archbishop Helder Camara I offered to move from mainstream schools to work with the disadvantaged. This took me to pastoral work with Aborigines in Adelaide and then the Aboriginal school, Nulungu, in Broome for five years. From here I responded to a call to Port Sudan in 1992 where a community of Brothers were restoring Comboni Secondary School to cope with an influx of refugees from the war in Eritrea. (Recall the "Live Aid" of singer Bob Geldof in 1985).

Port Sudan is under the repressive Muslim government, but the school ran well and pressure from Muslims to be enrolled gave us some protection from harassment – even to permitting student discos! In my fourth year I was A/HM of a school of 900 students, half of whom studied in English, and half in Arabic. I knew just enough Arabic to

go shopping! Tired out, I took a break (Wellsprings, NY) and offered for work in Yambio. South Sudan.

Yambio, possibly our most remote ministry, cut off behind the Sudan civil war, no phones, no power, no made roads. But I loved the little schoolaround 300 students, average age 21. The war had denied them proper education and they responded eagerly to our efforts to close the gap. With no government to set up education policies and few resources I loved the challenge. However this took its toll on me and I came out after three years. A referendum on independence looms up – offering hope for the strongly Christian people there.

I took a course in hospital chaplaincy (CPE) – possible future ministry and therapy from Yambio – but I was still keen to teach.

Invited to Port Moresby, Papua New Guinea, I offered my services to the newly established Jubilee Catholic Secondary School. As a volunteer (over age) I began what was possibly the most satisfying six years of my time in the classroom. Free just to take classes (senior Physics, Chemistry and Biology) I was totally at home in the laboratory. Community, with its mix of

Australian and PNG Christian Brothers was a rich experience too. I felt it was time for a break and was accepted for Sangre renewal course in New Mexico. Great group, great program, and scope on the mountain trails for my love of the outdoor life. I emerged ready for more!

The "more" is Murupara. Here I am privileged to experience the richness of Maori culture . With employment prospects in Murupara few – local forestry turned to mechanical harvesting many years back leaving many without work – students at Rangitahi school lack ambition and it is the toughest teaching I have met. Currently I take small groups – top end mathematics and science, and basic guitar – and at times console myself that Edmund had it tough in those early days too!

For me there is a deep satisfaction in being part of this place – indeed an expression of "making an option for the poor".

John Webb - Golden Jubilee

My schooling was at Loreto College, St Ignatius College and CBC. When I was in Intermediate we had a retreat in the newly built Passionist Retreat House. It was there that I decided that God was calling me to join the Christian Brothers. It was fifty years ago almost to the day, that I caught the Melbourne Express with other SA and WA hopefuls heading to the Juniorate at Bundoora.

After Juniorate, Novitiate and Teachers' College, I had five interstate moves in my first six years of teaching. I had one year at Clifton Hill in the inner suburbs of Melbourne, followed by a year in Hobart; I then spent two years in Whyalla, a year in Kalgoorlie and finally I was changed to Rostrevor College. Throughout this time I became very much involved in Outdoor Education and taking students on hikes and expeditions and I became involved in the newly established Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme.

At Rostrevor in the 1970s I was involved in many things. I was in charge of Year 10 and had the Year 10 Dormitory; I was involved in the Cadets; I studied towards my BA degree; I was supervisor of the extensive grounds and ovals; I helped to set up the Murray Venture (canoeing and hiking); and I became an instructor in the Outward Bound School at Clayton. It was a very challenging but enjoyable ten years.

I was back in Whyalla throughout the 1980s. These were my happiest years. I became fully involved in the local Whyalla Community. I acted in local theatre companies; I was the coordinator of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award for the Northern Region of SA; I was closely involved in a Prayer Group; I was on the English Teachers' Association; and I continued to organise the Murray Venture and Canoeing trips on the Murray and Darling Rivers. I was very busy, but I felt very fulfilled.

In 1990 I was changed to Perth. The Community at Leederville was great and we set out to live Religious Life in a new way, with Faith Sharing and looking after the needs of the Community (cooking, cleaning, gardening etc) ourselves. I taught at Aranmore College but found the teaching difficult. In 1992 I changed direction and did three Terms of Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) and also studied towards a Diploma in Counselling. I found the shift to pastoral work satisfying.

I was then offered a Sabbatical. I had three months at the St Beuno's Spirituality Centre in Wales. This was followed by time in Ireland, Rome, the Holy Land and India. When I returned, I was changed to Broome where I was employed by Notre Dame University. Soon after arrival I joined St John Ambulance and ultimately became chairperson, a position I held for five years. It was challenging, but wonderful to be so involved in something so very different from anything I had previously done and to work with such a dedicated group of volunteers.

On my return to Adelaide I studied towards a Masters degree in Counselling. Since then I have also done a course in Spiritual Direction. With the formation of the Oceania Province, I was appointed Cluster Leader of SA.

In July 2010 he represented Australia in the Under 19 Beach Volleyball team in Portugal.


Sam took out the Australian Beach Volleyball Championship in late January 2010.

Rostrevor's Heritage - Rostrevor in the 1950s

The first in a series of reflections on life at Rostrevor in the 1950s by John McInnes ('56).

The 50's had started. I moved from Ellangowan Primary School at St Peter's to Grade 6 at Rostrevor College. Peter, my eldest brother left there in 1949. David was still there in 2nd year so inevitably I had to follow on. Mum's sewing machine worked overtime. Material was transformed into a black blazer with red trim. A hand me down cap was found to perch on top of the head, black shoes were polished, at least for the first week, grey socks pulled up. I was ready to

go. Transport was a little more complicated. I grabbed the old leather kit bag and followed David out the door, down to a tram stop on Payneham Road. Several stops later we reached the Maid and Magpie corner. The next stage was the Morialta Tram up Magill Road. My journey had began.

We used to call the Morialta Tram the old rattler. As it bumped and lurched up to each stop boys would clamber up and fight their way into whatever space was left, standing room usually. Leather bags strewn everywhere. Then the fun began: Caps pinched off the head, thrown up the aisles, Prefects turning a blind eye to jostling, play fights, the tram conductor roaring at misbehaviour, weaving his way through the mob, punching tickets, taking money. The best moment came as the carriage hurtled north along St. Bernard's Road, slowed to take the sharp turn up Moules Road. 80% of the time the electric pole would slide off the cables overhead, the tram would shudder to a stop, throwing us all over each other. A cheer would lift the roof. We'd be late to school again as it took a good 5 - 10 minutes to realign and fit the pole back onto the

its load opposite the front gate. We would amble in through the green wrought iron gates and up the gravel driveway. Morning followed a ritual. Bags dumped outside the chapel. Everyone made a quick prayerful visit inside. As we passed the Lourdes Grotto caps would be raised in honour of Mary. Then up the grey bitumen pathway, down into the cool of the valley with huge gum trees towering overhead. A creek ran underneath the valley floor. Areas either side were out of bounds - the wasteland of olive trees up to the right towards the old house and the grassy incline to the left. Groups gathered, caps pinched again, chasey began, backs, arms thumped or jumped on, yells reverberated until the shrill sound of the bell called us to the Assembly. Within minutes all wooden doors would close and silence descend on the deserted verandahs of Mackey

The huge rotund figure of Br. Mogg dominated the mass of black blazers or grey suited figures at the first school assembly. In black cassock, white back to front collar he commanded attention, staring through his rimless glasses. His deep voice, rousing and exhorting the student body, would

become so familiar over the years. He always held his audience enthralled. The start of that school year whirled by in a kaleidiscope of images – dusty rooms, brown scratched desks, angry shout, thump of strap, slammed door, squeal of lifted window, inked fingers, torn pages, chalk screech, scuffed shoes, exercise books.

Rostrevor was a Boarding as well as a Day school. The country lads used to gather outside the old picture theatre at recess time. Usually they were starving by then so trays of jam sandwiches appeared from the kitchen. Within minutes these were wolfed down. Then the hunt was on as they went searching for the day scrags to cadge further food off them. We could never understand how these big hulking country lads were always starving.

About this time would come the rumble of pig cart wheels trundling down between the peppercorn trees, past the Bungalow avenue coming to a halt outside the kitchen back door, behind the old yellow wooden picture theatre. Though curious we were always a little afraid of the dark swarthy faces peering down from the

back of the cart. Empty bins were quickly lifted off, replaced by bins full of kitchen scraps. They were the lads doing "time" at the nearby Magill Boys' Reformatory. Each Friday the routine continued but we never dared speak to these young "crims" as they were dubbed. They inhabited a completely alien world so we thought in our innocence!


Vivid memories link those times. At

recess time hordes of hungry youngsters, cash in grubby hands, lined up outside the little round tuck shop at the top of the hill. Sinkers we called them, chester squares, thick wedges of spicy fruit filled cake covered in sickly pink icing, made up from left overs at the Magill Bakery. As fast as they filled them the trays were emptied as 6d changed hands. With full stomachs we would stream onto


the Bungalow oval for 20 minutes of freedom. Tennis balls were thrown high in the sky for the pack to form, leaping on other shoulders trying to take the screamer. Early in the year footballs were sent soaring, the mob would fly, bodies crash into each other, pull, wrestle, snatch at the prize then one body would scramble away across the grass chased by screaming classmates before managing to kick it

to the other end. Grazed knees, torn shirts, sweaty bodies, scuffed shoes, grass stains were the order of each day till the siren sound and the class room duty call.

Professor Robert Creelman

Transcript of 1959 Graduate Bob Creelman's Address as Guest Speaker to the 2010 Graduating Class

I feel privileged that I can express these things to you today at the end of your time here, at the start of your lives into the wider world. You have hopes and dreams, you have choices, and you will now be responsible for your own future. Let me tell you of the journey that I trod from 1959 when I was at the open door as you are now.

I came to Rostrevor from Tennant Creek, but I was at a boarding hostel run by the AIM in Alice Springs for bush kids and attended Alice Springs Higher

Primary School. After a run in with the Northern Territory Mounted Police my father decided to send me to Adelaide. So I came to Rostrevor College on a cold and very windy night after an 8 hour journey in a DC3. One of those picking me up was Brother Kelty. Next morning, at breakfast while we were saying Grace, a hand from the kid next to me descended on my plate of Weeties transferring a handful from my plate to his. "Put it Back" I said "Get stuffed" he answered. He looked me straight in the eye. Territorians are rather direct people, not intimidated, so I answered Territory style. I punched that smirking, challenging face hard and sure and broke his nose. Br Kelty witnessed this and escorted me from the room. "I always have this problem with you boys from the Territory" he said "and I always have to give this one final warning. You do not solve problems with violence. If you do violence comes down on you" I was shown the cane, but it was not used. Not a good start to my Rostrevor years. I was returned to the room so with one hit (pun intended) Br Kelty joined the ranks of those to be most feared and respected, equal to the Northern Territory Mounted Police. Dad

had to pay for the kid's medical treatment which caused other problems. I vowed to myself never to behave like that again and grasp the opportunity that had come my way.

There were times of immense self doubt and loneliness in the early times at Rostrevor. One night I went to the base of the outside spiral stairs that led to Br Kelty's study. I had come to the end, confused and becoming resentful. What was I doing here, at this school, why was I at the base of these steps seeking to now pour this all out to someone?

I was welcomed into a warm place and for the next two hours was encouraged, counseled and felt the warmth of a caring focused person who could relate to the deepest needs I had at that time. It was transforming. I went back one more time in my school life to that study, but that was to be encouraged into an academic career. Mathematics and Science were my strengths; Br Kelty became my inspiration intellectually and morally and remains so. I was well armed for the world when I came to walk out of Rostrevor. I had passed from sprog stockman to sprog scientist/ engineer.

There was a period of adjustment. I had never been to Mass before, never said the Rosary. I vowed to make the best of the situation and did all that was asked, and more. I worked hard at school for the first time and discovered that school work was enjoyable and sometimes easy; I started to achieve and continued to do so. I became involved in sport, and in 1958 was swimming Champion. I made the First 18 in 1959. In that year I was in the Intercollegiate Athletics team and our relay team set a record that lasted for a number of years. It was compulsory to join the cadets, and I joined the other Territory kids who dominated the Rifle Team. In 1959 we swept the field of all prizes, in fact we were second in the Commonwealth. In 1959 I received two prizes; Mathematics II and Proxime Accessit. It took me 30 years to realize that I had come second in the College in Leaving Honours to Kevin Duggan. Latin was not my strong

The year before (1958) Roger Francey was Dux and he obtained a PhD and became a well recognized scientist with CSIRO. I obtained a PhD in Geology specializing in geochemistry. Previous to that I completed 3 years of an

Engineering degree, and teaching qualifications with an intervening period teaching in Papua New Guinea. I was still seeking frontiers. In later years I obtained recognition in the power industry in engineering fields. Similar to Roger I worked for a period with CSIRO, but developing a system for automated mineralogy.

I continued to keep in contact with Br Kelty after he left Rostrevor to become Superior General of the order. There he continued to work in the Christian Brothers Spirit.

The world I inhabited in the 1950s and the 1960s was a very different one from that of today.

We did not have drugs; we did not have the pressures of prosperity and confusing choices. I am blessed by a loving wife of 45 years and 4 children, all of whom are my friends. I count the strength and unity of my family as my greatest achievement.

You are possibly more aware of the world, and in some aspects better educated. I now ask you to consider what is of most value to you in your life that that you have obtained from being at this school. You may not know now, but perhaps you will discover as you accumulate life experiences. I will tell you mine. Mine was exposure to Christianity. Within the teachings of the Church, and with the examples of the lives of the Brothers and some fellow students I saw Christ and a better way of living. It took some time to sink in but finally it did. At school I read voraciously; lives of the Saints, Catholic teachings and traditions, church history, and the Bible. I realized the value of faith and as Br Kelty once told me Faith is a gift from God. So began a faith journey that continues now.

The Catholic Church has produced

Michael Murphy



Michael Murphy

The name Mick Murphy is synonymous with Rostrevor College. In Rostrevor circles there are few old scholars (but there are some) who would be as well know as Mick. There would be even fewer (maybe none!) who would know as many old scholars and their families and their connections as Mick.

In introducing Michael at an interstate function, former Headmaster, Br Dean McGlaughlin, quipped 'I would like to introduce to you Mr Michael Murphy – the ubiquitous Rostrevor old scholar".

When Mick recalled this introduction when being interviewed for this piece, I suggested that it may be necessary to define ubiquitous in order for the wider reading public to appreciate the remark. Mick seemed to think that would not be necessary – but I still do.

Ubiquitous: ever-present, everywhere, omnipresent.

That is how I have found Mick Murphy to be and I am sure that is the same for the wider Rostrevor old scholar community. With this omnipresence are lashings of sincerity and generosity.

Michael Murphy (Mick or Murph) commenced as a boarder from
Torrensville with his half brother Sean in 1957. They started as day scholars but after one Term entered the boarding house at the suggestion of Matron
Duggan. Mick's mother, Sadie, passed away when Mick was 5 years old. He started school at St Joseph's Thebarton, and went on to St Aloysius, Marist

Brothers, Thebarton, St Ignatius with an occasional sojourn with the Salesian Fathers, Boystown, at Brooklyn Park and then Rostrevor. Micks father Daniel attended C.B.C Wakefield Street.

At school Mick enjoyed a number of co-curricular outlets including YCS, St Vincent de Paul Society, a competitor in Eisteddfods, cricket, tennis, swimming and diving. He was also involved in the end of year G & S musicals "Trial by Jury", in which he was a bridesmaid, and The Mikado as Pish-Tush, a noble lord.

His main passion in sport was football and he represented Rostrevor in the 1st XVIII in 1962. Mick eventually went on to play league football for West Torrens. After trialling with his mate Peter May ('62) at North Adelaide and making the squad, he found Aquinas College didn't qualify him as a North Adelaide resident so he stood out of football for three years trying to gain a clearance. His clearance was held up by the vote of prominent barrister and "Brothers" old scholar Frank Moran OC, a West Torrens committeeman. In that period Mick was a sporting journeyman, playing for Broadview, Adelaide Teachers' College, Eudunda, North Adelaide Districts and finally with his brother Sean at CBOC's, as well as for Thebarton in the Sunday YCW competition where he was captain coach. He eventually relented and fronted at Thebarton where he was to play 10 League games. His career was cut short after an injury received when he was chosen in the State squad, under

coach Neil Kerley, to play Gaelic football against County Meath.

League footy's loss was Rostrevor Old Collegians gain, as Mick went on to co-found (1974) Captain and Coach and later filled the role as President of the ROCS. He was bestowed Life Membership of the club in 2003. He remains actively involved today as a long term Gold Sponsor of the Club and is respected by all associated with the Club for his generosity and loyalty.

During his final year at the College, Mick's father took ill and he can still remember the support and compassion offered by (Br) Bernie Cormie during that testing time.

With his Leaving Honours results Mick was offered a Teaching Scholarship at Adelaide Teachers' College and took up residence at Aquinas College as mentioned.

In his first year at Teachers College the famous late Dr Harry Penny decided teaching was not for him. Many years later Dr Penny remarked at a social function "it was probably the best decision ever made for him".

Mick then transferred from Science to Engineering and due to economic circumstances delayed studies and entered the work force full time with the SA Tractor Company and stayed there until no longer required in 1971.

He then plied his many acquired skills mainly in hospitality and the women's fashion industry in design, manufacture, retailing and importing. His most notable position at this time was at the hub of the Adelaide entertainment scene as night manager of the Old Lion Hotel, rubbing shoulders with rich and famous in the entertainment industry.

In that year he also "swam the Torrens" and purchased his residence in Leabrook which has been the family home ever since, but for a short period when inhabited by some not so friendly ROCS.

Around 1974 he joined his future father in law, Colin Anderson (Head Prefect at Rostrevor 1939) in a marketing role in Meclock Fencing, a business he assumed in 1980. The business expanded into vineyard trellising.

In 1977 he married Charlotte Anderson in the College Chapel celebrated by Fr. Greg O'Kelly S.J. and they have six children. Amelia, Bridget, Patrick, Esther, Grace and Ellen

In 1986, with 6 kids under six years old and broke, Mick, out of economic necessity, engineered another career

move and stepped into Life Insurance. In that same year, with another old scholar, Michael Mason ('69), they constructed the perimeter fence on the Olympic Dam mine site and the metallurgical plant security fence – his last hurrah in the fencing industry.

By 1990 he had established Murphy Financial Services which over the years has changed names to Murphy Financial Solutions and now Murphy Financial Advice. Recently he has transitioned the business and old scholar Darren Furst ('97) is the new principal.

As well as his close involvement with the ROCS Mick has held the role of President of the Rostrevor Old Collegians' Association and Chairman of the Rostrevor College Foundation and chaired the Rostrevor Community Coordination Committee.

When asked to recall some anecdotes from his varied associations with

Rostrevor one such recollection related to Tom Kendell, the legendary Economics and Ancient History teacher and athletics coach at Rostrevor (1955-1973). Mick was not taught by Tom while at school but developed a strong relationship with him post-school through old scholar associations and as coach of Broadview Football Club. It is not well known that Tom Kendell was the first Chairmen/ President of the ROCFC. Mick was coach in ROCS inaugural year and after a particular three quarter time address early in the season, Tom resigned as Chairman over 'the coaches use of colourful language.' Mick still recalls this incident with a great deal of mirth as he remained good friends with Tom up until his death in July 2001. Just for the record, the ROCFC Honour Board records the first President as Jack McAuliffe, who took over after Tom resigned!

Another anecdote involves boarding, Br Miller, a late night and a Loreto girl.

In 1962, Mick, Kevin Casanova (R.I.P.) and two other boarders travelled to the city, as you did, as the Rostrevor debating team. According to Mick, Kevin had a sweetheart at Loreto who offered to drive them home so the lads missed the last bus and were chauffeured back to the College in due course. Unbeknown to them, Br Miller was lurking in the shadows and witnessed their arrival and Kevin's affectionate farewell to the driver.

All four eventually proceeded upstairs to the Senior Dorm. While getting undressed for bed, a voice came through the darkness asking the fellows who had just arrived back at the College to report to 'my room'.

Scantily clad, and feeling extremely vulnerable the recalcitrants attempted to explain to Br Miller that they had missed the last bus and had caught a taxi home. Br Miller considered their response and then replied, 'If that's the case Casanova, I observed you being very intimate with the taxi driver'.

Additional to Mick's many voluntary roles related to Rostrevor College, over the years he has involved himself in many professional and charitable associations. He has been on the Agents Association for Legal and General Insurance, on the Board of the Association of Financial Advisors, President of the Association for 3 years, Chair of the Government and Policy Committee since 1999 and Australian delegate to the Asia Pacific Financial

Services Association (AP Fin SA) and the International Federation of Financial Standards (IFFS). Mick was involved with St Vincent de Paul and on the steering committee of the SVDP Foundation and the Mary Potter Hospice Foundation. Through his involvement in the Association of Financial Advisors he established a fund for Multiple Sclerosis research and is a trustee of that Foundation and is on the Board of the Bone Growth Foundation.

In 2009 the Association of Financial Advisers established the Michael Murphy Award, to recognise outstanding services to the Financial Services Industry.

Mick has experienced some serious health issues over the last 5 years. The hallmark of the man is that he has not let that diminish his involvement and commitment to his family, his work and his many other community and professional interests. The ROCA wish him well and thank him for his many contributions to the Rostrevor College community over so many years.

John Foote



From the 1928 Annual: John Foote – Intermediate

My father, John Foote, attended Rostrevor College between 1925 and 1928, along with his older brother Tony (Anthony).

Dad, Uncle Tony and their sisters Mary and Pat, led a comfortable life in the leafy eastern suburbs until tragedy struck. Dad's father, James, died in 1932, at the height of the Depression when Dad was 17, leaving his wife, Catherine, a widow – she was to remain that way for almost 40 years until her death in 1971 aged 87. Grandpa Foote, being a great punter, unfortunately left his wife penniless with four children to raise so it became Dad's job to care for his mum, which he did until the day she died.

He left Adelaide for Kadina at the age of 17 to drive the giant wool trucks. I don't know much about the in-between years, but in 1941 he went to war. Dad sailed out of Melbourne on the troop ship 'Mauritania' with the 2nd 9th Australian General Hospital battalion. During his time away he worked with the army surgeons travelling the world from Egypt, Palestine, India, to finally Port Moresby, New Guinea. Uncle Tony was there in New Guinea too, working in the supply department where he allegedly ran a highly successful two-up ring. They both returned safely and Dad with his great sense of humour would regale everyone with old wartime stories, although he never once spoke of the bad things.

Like many returned soldiers, Dad was offered land on Kangaroo Island but turned it down, opting instead to earn his wool-classing certificate. He did a 12-month apprenticeship with the Dean family at 'Narinne' station at Kalangadoo and following that worked at stations all over north-western New South Wales including Bourke, Broken Hill and Wilcannia. Tony was with him again – a real larrikin and whiz with figures who sharpened his skills working for a local bookie in Broken Hill

At this point, Dad was single, in his forties and probably wishing to settle down – life was tough on the stations, living in tin sheds with no airconditioning in soaring summer temperatures (the shearers used to think up ingenious ways to keep the beer cold) – so he moved back to Adelaide. Goldsborough Mort, as Elders was known back then, put him in charge of a floor down at their Port Adelaide wool store, which involved getting the wool ready for sale and liaising with all the buyers who came mainly from Melbourne and Sydney.

Then life changed in 1956, when Dad met his wife-to-be Gwen at a Catholic singles social held at the Catholic Club in Angas Street. Dad was 45, Mum was 35, and according to both it was love at first sight. Dad had just bought his first, and last, home at 38 Swan Street, Grange, and he and Gwen moved in, together with his mother, after marrying at St Lawrence's Church, North Adelaide in April 1958. They honeymooned in Melbourne and then along came three children: Bernadette, Mary Anne and Claire.

Sadly, Dad died in 1981 aged only 69 following a massive heart attack.

Greatly missed by all who knew him – he was a true gentleman of the old school who never lost sight of his ideals or humour through any hardship.

Professor Nathan Gianneschi

In November 2010, Nathan Gianneschi ('94), a chemistry professor at the University of California, San Diego received America's highest honor awarded by the White House to researchers at the outset of their professional scientific careers. Nathan is an assistant professor of chemistry and biochemistry at UCSD.

The award is the highest honor bestowed by the U.S. government on scientists and engineers beginning their independent careers. Nine federal departments and agencies annually nominate scientists and engineers who are at the start of their independent careers and whose work shows exceptional promise.

Gianneschi, who is developing next generation advanced hybrid materials that combine naturally occurring molecules such as DNA and protein with manmade molecules, was nominated by the Defense Department, which will provide him with a research grant along with the award. He was informed of the award by John P. Holdren, President Obama's science adviser and Director of the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy.

The White House dispatch read, 'President Obama named 85 researchers as recipients of the Presidential Early

Career Awards for Scientists and Engineers, the highest honor bestowed by the United States government on science and engineering professionals in the early stages of their independent research careers. The Presidential early career awards embody the high priority the Obama Administration places on producing outstanding scientists and engineers to advance the Nation's goals, tackle grand challenges, and contribute to the American economy. Ten Federal departments and agencies join together annually to nominate the most meritorious scientists and engineers whose early accomplishments show the greatest promise for assuring America's preeminence in science and engineering and contributing to the awarding agencies' missions.

"Science and technology have long been at the core of America's economic strength and global leadership," President Obama said. "I am confident that these individuals, who have shown such tremendous promise so early in their careers, will go on to make breakthroughs and discoveries that will continue to move our nation forward in the years ahead."

Nathan attended Rostrevor with his brothers Ben and Marc and his father, Leon, served on the Rostrevor Board for a number of years. Nathan was a Prefect and was awarded the 'Thomas Joseph O'Connor Prize' for English in his final year at Rostrevor. He also represented Rostrevor at Cricket and Hockey.

On leaving school he studied at the University of Adelaide were he awarded a B. Sc. (Hons) in 1999. In 2005 he won his PhD at Northwestern University, Illinois.

In 2008 he was awarded a Postdoctoral Fellowship at The Scripps Research Institute

The UCSD website states his research interests to be 'The ability to control the assembly and destruction of nanoscale materials in response to

specific biomolecular stimuli is expected to have a significant impact in targeted drug delivery and advanced sensor design. Our program takes a multidisciplinary approach to the development of novel, stimuli responsive supramolecular and nanoscale materials by combining synthetic organic and inorganic chemistry with biological molecules and polymers.

Last year, along with Drs Mark Hutchinson and David Lupton, Nathan was awarded a total of \$270,000 in fellowship grants from the American Australian Association (AAA) to pursue research and studies in the US.

The ROCA sincerely congratulate him on this outstanding achievement and wish him well for the future. *Palma Merenti*

News from 1999 graduate Adam Gerace informs that he has recently been bestowed 2010 Australian Psychological Society (APS) Psychology of Relationships Interest Group Thesis Award for 2010. The award was presented to Adam for his PhD thesis, which was completed in the School of Psychology, University of South Australia in 2009. The award is presented to a higher degree candidate whose work advances theory and scientific research in the area of psychology of relationships. Adam's thesis was judged as "impressive and a major contribution to the field". Adam received his award at the Group's annual conference in Brisbane (November 5-6). Adam also received the 2010 Tony Winefield PhD Thesis Prize in Psychology, which recognises the best PhD thesis submitted in the School of Psychology, Social Work and Social Policy, University of South Australia.

Adam's thesis entitled The influence of past experience on the process of perspective taking examined how people take the psychological point of view of others and experience empathy. The examiners especially praised the work, with Emeritus Professor Rosalind Cartwright (Rush University), who conducted much of the original research into empathy in the 1940s referring to the thesis as 'a very original piece of research on a major topic in Social Psychology', while Professor Mark Davis (Eckerd College), who is responsible for developing the most widely used measure of empathy, commended Dr Gerace on 'producing a first-class examination of perspective taking'.

Adam graduated Rostrevor with a TER in the high 90s and two Merit Awards for English Studies and Ancient Histrory.

In 2003 he graduated with a Bachelor of Psychology (First Class Honours) from Uni SA and along the way received a bundle of Dean's Merits and Chancellor's Commendations

His current role is as a Postdoctoral Research Fellow (Mental Health) at the School of Nursing & Midwifery at Flinders University.

Through thee years he has worked as a Sessional Tutor and Marker and as a Research Assistant and he has had published numerous research reports, journal articles and book chapters as well as having presented to a number of conferences.



Ralph Crook - Obituary



From the 1943 Annual: Ralph Crook

Ralph Crook ('44) attended Rostrevor for 8 years from 1937. His brother Dallas attended from 1932. On leaving school he worked as a professional engineer who devoted most of his working life to defence research and development in the service of our country at the Defence Science and Technology Organisation (DSTO) at Salisbury, South Australia. During his long career Ralph worked on many projects but his colleagues consider his work during the period 1982 to 1986 was one of the highlights. Ralph led the effort to design and develop the launcher for a rocket-powered decoy for an electronic warfare decoy system

known as NULKA. Ralph's efforts on the launcher for Nulka were ultimately highly successful and formed part of what has become Australia's most successful defence export. Today we can see launchers of Ralph's design fitted to all major warships in the USN Navy, the Royal Australian Navy and the Royal Canadian Navy. The Nulka decoy system is the most effective system for defending ships against missile attack that has ever been produced.

Ralph was a good man, a gentleman, modest, of good character, and with high integrity. He was extremely persistent in tackling the challenges of his work, coming back again and again, approaching problems from different directions, chipping away at the them, breaking problems down so he could grapple better with them until he finally made the breakthrough.

Ralph is survived by his wife Moira and his much loved daughters Nicole and Susanne, son-in-law Graham and grandchildren Ryan and Liam.

Sergio Rusciano ('71) died after a battle with heart disease in January this year. As is evident in the following euology, Suds, as he was known to most while at Rostrevor, was a popular student and outstanding sprinter winning each sprint he competed in at the Combined over a 5 year period. He was also Captain of O'Brien House.

I first met Serg in Grade Two at St Josephs Hectorville. In Grade Three Serg began at Rostrevor College while I spent the remaining years at St Josephs.

Interestingly, we still kept in contact as Serg would revel in the fact Rostrevor College started holidays one day before us and went back one day after us. He would ride a bike to the fence abutting St Josephs and talk to us at recess and lunch time. We were all envious that he always got more holidays than us.

When I began at Rostrevor College we were once again school chums. It didn't take long to realise that Sudsy was the most popular guy in class. Everybody knew Serg. In fact, if you attended Rostrevor College in the sixties and early seventies and had not heard of Suds Rusciano you were either a liar or a mushroom. I was soon recruited into the athletics team and started with the sprint squad so Serg and I saw much more of each other. I soon learned that I was no

match for the guy that was built like Ben Johnson. Serg was the most explosive sprinter I have ever seen at school. In the U/13's Serg not only won the 100 metres State titles but he broke the existing record and held that for ten years. He excelled in 100, 220 yards, long and triple jump. At the combined sports, the biggest event in our calendar, Serg would win the 100 yards by an incredible margin of at least 10 to 15 yards. Serg and I were fortunate enough to have lived through the golden years of athletics at the College. He loved the attention athletics gave him and he was a performer of extraordinary ability. Our final year saw Serg win a tough 100 yards at the Combined sports in wet soggy conditions. Every year Tom Kendall would give the coveted "golliwog" to the best athlete and performance on the day. Serg was the popular choice that year.

This stellar athletics career however did not spill into the classroom. Serg never really liked study much so I guess we both had much in common. In fact the only time I saw Suds with text books was at the legendary arm wrestling match in Matric. Yes Suds pitted against a 6'4 giant in Larry Konopka. There was no doubting Sudsy's strength as helping Genarro in the market gardens had paid off. Serg had well developed and proportioned triceps, biceps and everything else. The problem was arm length. Serg needed a few books under his elbow to be able to reach Goliaths hand. After much grunting and groaning Serg succumbed to Larry. Yeah, I groaned too as I had put a dollar on

Eventually we parted ways. I went to Uni and Serg forged his career. Even through this period of time we remained close friends. Parties at the Rusciano's were familiar and the meeting place for all our

mates. Pizza's at Vesuvio's and Luigi's was a ritual most nights. Sergio then started dating my sister Viv and eventually became my brother-in-law. They produced 3 wonderful children in Leah, Gabriele and Narah. Uncle Serg was always a favourite with my three boys.

I watched and saw this loveable schoolboy larrikin transform into a caring father that never compromised his leisure time for anybody. His babies were his life. Rarely would you see Serg without the children. As they grew older Serg would get more excited. He couldn't wait for Gab to be old enough to trail bike ride and even acquired some land around Swan Reach for just such occasions. Serg had always had a love for nature. Outdoors was always Serg at his best. The beach, travelling, canoeing in fact anything in the sun. Serg loved photography and I am sure there are plenty of photos around the Rusciano house to prove this.

Serg was a real Elvis fan and would play Elvis music regularly. Serg often thought

he looked like Elvis and would belt out a song while twisting into a few familiar hip swings.

Sergio was ever close to his mother Amalia. When he lost her a few years ago a big part of Sergio went missing. Maybe there was a similarity with Elvis after all? Elvis too changed when he lost his mother?

Serg left knowing that his children were left in good hands. Serg thought the world of his son-in-laws, Jared and Cristian. Those of us that knew him know that Serg would be the consummate Nonno for Charlize.

This is the Sergio I grew up with and this is the Sergio I loved to be with. Serg was a good friend and the most loveable rogue I have known.



Eugene Shirley - Obituary



From the 1935 Annual: Eugene Shirley

Eugene Shirley attended Rostrevor from 1931 to 1935 after attending Strathalbyn Primary, the Mercy Convent at Henley and CBC Wakefield St. In his final year at Rostrevor, Eugene approached Br Carroll and offered his services as cox to the rowing four established that year. His involvement in rowing at Rostrevor quickly became 'historic' as it was the first and last rowing team representing Rostrevor College to date.

A recent visitor to Rostrevor was Ty Peters, son of old scholar Kym ('71) and Chris Peters. Ty attended at the invitation of College Chaplain and old scholar Joe Hicks ('92). As Chaplain, Joe invited Ty to speak at the regular Wednesday staff morning prayer service in the Chapel to tell his story related to his football injury and subsequent neurological damage which has significantly effected his life.

Ty and Joe were acquainted as Junior footballers in the Salisbury/Elizabeth comp and in SANFL Under 17 squads and more recently through World Youth Day Pilgrimages to Europe and Sydney.

Ty told his story to staff of a behind the play incident while playing in a football final for Salisbury West whereby he was struck in the head and was seriously concussed. Later that night he was rushed to hospital in what became a life threatening experience. The damage from the incident caused serious neurological trauma but thankfully Ty recovered. He is now severely restricted in his mobility but that experience has not dampened Ty's view on the world, his sense of humour or his faith. His ability to deal with his physical setbacks is inspirational stuff.

Ty attended St Thomas Moore College and is one of 4 children to Kym and Chris

Through Kym's long association with the ROCS, Ty has had no choice but to happily follow his family in support of the Club and is a regular Saturday spectator. His uncles, Craig, Dean and Lee also played for the ROCS in the early years of the club with Craig a Captain of the Club in that time.

Joe Hicks joined the staff at Rostrevor in 2010 as a Boarding House supervisor. He has completed a Bachelor of Theology and is part way through his Diploma in Education. Last year he was also appointed part time Youth Chaplain and in that role he mentors boys in their faith journey and supports the Mission of the College to nurture in students an understanding to be men for others, men of faith and men who know and understand the history and traditions of the College. Joe attended Rostrevor for one year in 1992 and is the son of former staff member Daryl Hicks. Joe has had a distinguished football career at both Sturt and Central Districts and at the conclusion of his SANFL stint he played for the ROCS under Tim Symes.
