FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Putting Our Students Wellbeing First



Positive psychology and student wellbeing are becoming more and more central to the life of schools. Research shows that one in four Secondary students will face a mental health issue at some stage of their schooling and one in six in the Primary Years. Physical and mental wellbeing are foundational to all else that we do in schools. Without creating the right environment, everything else, including academic success, falls by the wayside.

In June our Prefects led the College in Blue Week where issues of mental wellbeing were discussed openly and information was provided to all students on support that they could seek, as well as understanding the signs that others may exhibit when they are doing it tough. I was so proud of our student leaders for the way they embraced this responsibility and their openness to speak with students on what is often perceived to be a sensitive topic. In addition they raised valuable funds to support beyondblue.

Recently Cheree Taylor from the Principals Australia Institute spoke with our staff about two important frameworks: KidsMatter for Primary Schools and MindMatters for Secondary Schools. These are frameworks for promoting mental health and wellbeing in school environments. The frameworks are supported by the Australian Government Department of Health, beyondblue and the Principals Australia Institute.

These are not programs as such but staff training courses designed to develop a whole school approach to mental health and wellbeing.

There are four core components: 1) Positive School Community; 2) Social and Emotional Learning for Students; 3) Working with Parents and Carers; and 4) Helping Children with Mental Health Difficulties.

The guiding principles of the frameworks are:

- The best interests of children are paramount
- · Respectful relationships are foundational
- · Diversity is respected and valued
- Parents and carers are recognised as the most important people in children's lives
- · Parents and teachers support children best by working together
- Students need to be active participants
- · Schools, health and community agencies work together with families

We are currently in the process of establishing an implementation team to help guide our efforts to ensure that our practices are responsive to the issues that children face and to continue to promote an environment that is conducive to positive growth and wellbeing.

I draw parallels between the above and how Rostrevor provides and enhances the life experience for our boys. How it brings it all together. It provides facilities for a broad and diverse range of boys and their families, from many varied ethnic and socio-economic backgrounds. The variety of those cultures, attitudes

and the way each family raises their boy outside of the College environment is a learning experience in itself for every other boy at the College. It means our boys are not exposed to the "blandness of sameness" as many other schools that institute unspoken of enrolment policies which produce an entire school cohort of the same types of boys and parents. The truth is these types of policies should be called out for what they really are - exclusion policies - at Rostrevor the opposite applies where a positive inclusive policy is applied to enrolments meaning diversity is celebrated, encouraged and welcomed. In my view it better prepares our boys for the real world. As parents we are aware that life after school changes dramatically, in the real world you are compelled to deal with people from all walks of life.

Just as the College **dreams**, **plans** and **builds** our facilities so it does with our boys. Rostrevor College in conjunction with us as parents has a **dream** that each of our boys can become anything they want to be. It then sets out to **plan** how that will occur and finally, in a team effort with us, **builds** that future over the time our sons experience life at Rostrevor.

Enjoy your future, red and black is in our blood.

STAGE ONE OF THE MASTER **BUILDING PLAN FACILITY LAUNCH**

Marian Day, Friday 14th August, was a bigger occasion than usual, as it was also a celebration of the blessing and opening of our \$4 million refurbishment of key teaching and learning facilities.

While the newly created Equity Hub and Ideas Centre are the centrepieces of this transformation, it is worth remembering that the upgrade incorporated the Skills Centre, Art Rooms, classrooms in the Rice Building, upstairs Mogg classrooms and the creation of a footbridge and two new classrooms above the Junior Campus administration building. It was a much needed overhaul which has brought these facilities well and truly into the 21st century.

Such a critical overhaul of so much of the campus was only possible through the generous support of the Rostrevor College Foundation which contributed \$2 million to the project. It is good to know that your contributions to the Foundation have helped to provide a much needed facelift for our campus. Likewise, the generous support of the Parents and Friends Association who provided \$50,000 towards the installation of critical technology throughout the facilities was gratefully received.

With the massive improvement in our academic results over the last three years, we hope the enhancements to these facilities will add further to the quality of the teaching and learning experience for all of our students.

REAL GOOD MEN

'Stella Fellas and Stella Bellas'





Early in the year, the student Social Justice Group identified respectful relationships as a priority for this year: recognising that justice must begin with the person next to us. Our aim is that every student identifies himself as a 'Real Good Man,' someone who has integrity, respects himself, respects others and respects the environment.

In a year where Australian of the Year, Rosie Batty, is highlighting issues of the use of physical, verbal and emotional violence against women, the Social Justice Group sees that as 'Real Good Men,' we must have respectful relationships with the females in our lives, including our family members, our friends and members of staff. We want to take a stand against the use of put downs, inappropriate comments and especially physical or verbal force in relationships. We want to learn from the 'Real Good Women and Girls' in our lives and to challenge sexist attitudes in our College and in the wider community.

Social Justice Captains, Will Critchley and Marcus Sosa, have met with the Social Justice group from our sister school, Loreto College, to talk about ways we can learn from each other and work together on this issue. Maddie Kelly, Social Justice Co-ordinator and Youth Minister from St Aloysius College, spoke to the Social Justice Group about the global aspects of right relationships, highlighting the topic of Human Trafficking, which exists not just in developing countries but here in Australia – even in Adelaide, according to a recent Four Corners program on the ABC.

On Friday 21st August, we were joined by hundreds of Edmund Rice students in Australia, under the banner of Edmund Rice Action for Change (ERA for Change), in a national campaign to raise awareness about violence against women, to support Anti-Human Trafficking organisations. We invited the Real Good Men of Rostrevor College to sign the White Ribbon pledge: "I swear never to commit, excuse or remain silent about violence against women".

Our Red and Black Disco that evening (for students in Years 8 - 10) also took on the theme Stella Fellas And Stella Bellas, 'Real Good Men' of Rostrevor looking good and using their voices to speak out for a world where everyone feels comfortable and safe.

PATHWAYS TO POST-SECONDARY

Introducing a New Initiative

"The new concept was designed to expose students to a broad range of career exploration experiences focused around five key areas which allowed all students to personally develop, explore, discover. plan and to ultimately grow." Rostrevor College introduced a new program for all Year 10 students at the end of Term 2 called 'Pathways to Post-Secondary.' This program has been piloted in 2015 as a replacement for the Year 10 four day Work Experience Program.

It was noted that many schools across Australia were in the process of reviewing their Work Experience Programs due to the introduction of new Work Health and Safety (WHS) laws, new Workplace Learning Guidelines, client confidentiality and the impact that university undergraduate placement has had on the capacity of younger secondary students ability to secure suitable placements which value add to their future career aspirations.

The new concept was designed to expose students to a broad range of career exploration experiences focused around five key areas which allowed all students to personally develop, explore, discover, plan and to ultimately grow. Using these key words the program was individualised on the students personal development and growth.

Day one, iDevelop, saw all Year 10 students participate in workshops focused on vocational study areas and workplace training. We also had Old Collegians Tom Jonas ('08) and Jack Hombsch ('10), current players for the Port Adelaide Football Club, return and speak to the students about their personal school and work life journey and how to capitalise on opportunities that can be accessed by all students.

Day two, iExplore, was spent at Flinders University where students participated in a variety of sessions including Paramedic, Science, Engineering, Business and Psychology. A highlight of the day was hearing from Old Collegian, Tom Brown ('14), who encouraged students to be open to individual career exploration; to look globally and to explore Career Clusters instead of individual degrees.

Day 3, iDiscover, this time saw the Year 10 cohort split into two groups with one participating in activities delivered by the University of South Australia at the Mawson Lakes Campus, while the other attended Adelaide University. Standout activities for many students were tooth moulding, engineering, robotics, business, health and IT workshops.





The last day of the four day program, *iGrow*, saw Old Collegians Daniel Rigon ('09) Angelo Varricchio ('12) and Tait Reid ('14) invited back for a Q&A session called *Beyond the Gates of Rostrevor*. Following this students rotated through workshops on etiquette, aptitude, advertising and an interesting session called *60 Second Pitch*. Students also had the opportunity to participate in the Career Conversation Morning Tea where the students hosted industry representatives in small discussion groups.

Feedback from students, parents and industry representatives has been very positive towards the program with one student saying that "It was better than my expectations".

Young men who are mentally healthy learn better, benefit from all life experiences and have stronger relationships with family members, school staff and their peers. Positive mental health in childhood provides a solid foundation for; managing the transition to adolescence and adulthood, engaging successfully in education and making meaningful contributions to society.

For all Primary aged children, after their families, school provides the most significant 'developmental' context. All schools therefore play a crucial role in building children's self esteem and their sense of competence. Schools also act as a safety net and assist in protecting children from circumstances that affect their learning, development and wellbeing.

To support the development of the young men of the Rostrevor College Junior Campus, we understand and embrace our role as partners in your sons' education and personal and emotional development. To assist us in working closely with families and the community and to continually look at providing the best environment to support the boys' mental health and wellbeing, we will be forming an Action Team to implement Kidsmatter Primary.

Kidsmatter is a framework funded by the Commonwealth Department of Health. It is underpinned by decades of solid, evidence based research about mental health and wellbeing and the benefits of social and emotional learning in schools. From a strong research base, indications are that greater mastery of social and emotional learning improves students' personal development, readiness to learn, classroom behaviour and academic performance.

As a Junior Campus, we look forward to developing our understanding of the framework. Upon reaching the implementation stage of the major initiative we will seek to engage with and involve our whole school community for this to be a sustainable future for us.





Bequests

Charles Guthrie August Koch ('62)

We extend our thanks to the Koch family for their bequest on behalf of Charles Guthrie August Koch. A respected member of the community and well-liked by everyone he met, Charlie will be remembered as a true gentleman and generous man.

Born on May 11, 1946 Charlie died on December 20, 2013, aged 67.

The Koch family lived in Naracoorte while the family home at Tallageira was being built in the early 1950s.

Charlie started primary school at the Catholic Convent in Naracoorte until the house at Tallageira was finished in 1952, after which he transferred to Frances Primary School. At age 11 Charlie became a boarder at Rostrevor College - where he went through to Leaving Honours in 1962.

Winning a Commonwealth Scholarship, which would have covered his university fees, Charlie considered studying law but was very passionate about farming and decided to return to the land and make farming his life's work

The 1960s were the time of the Vietnam War and conscription. After almost eight months of training with the army Charlie graduated as a Lieutenant and was posted to Lavarack Barracks in Townsville as a platoon commander.

At the end of his army service Charlie came home to the farm at Tallageira, spending his free time playing tennis and football for Border Districts - where he became a premiership ruckman.

In 1970 he met Julie Porter, who was a teacher at Frances Primary School - marrying her three years later on June 1, 1973 at Rostrevor College Chapel. Julie and Charlie have three beautiful children, Charlie, Louis and Alice. Both boys are now home on the land.

Charlie was the third generation of his family to farm at Tallageira - in February 2011, the Koch family had been farming there for 100 years.

During his lifetime Tallageira changed from a mostly grazing property to a very diverse mixed farming enterprise.

An astute businessman with a large portfolio of properties, Charlie was well known as a successful and fair negotiator in his business dealings.

Charlie, who gave generously to important community causes, was involved in many local organisations including sports, education, farming and local government. He was Shire President for two years and in local government for fifteen years.





THE COLLEGE ARCHIVES

For some time, Brother John Ahern, Andrew Robertson and Bernie Tobin have been involved in a messy, dusty, uncomfortable but absolutely vital activity; the collection of historical material spanning some ninety years of the life of Rostrevor.

ROSTREVOR OLD COLLEGIAN ASSOCIATION SCHOLARSHIPS

The Old Collegians' Association is proud to continue the tradition of helping sons and grandsons of Old Collegians to attend Rostrevor College.

For the last decade this has been by way of Uniform Bursaries to sons and grandsons who attended the College as boarders.

In 2013 the program was reviewed and it was decided to offer Scholarships to suitable applicants of sons and grandsons of Rostrevor past students.

In 2015 the ROCA has offered two such Scholarships for variable periods of time to students who otherwise may not have been able to attend Rostrevor.

To find out more about the Scholarship, in the first instance, speak with Enrolments Officer during the application process. As the Scholarships are means tested the recipients remain anonymous to the general community.

The ROCA has identified \$10,000 per annum for this purpose. The funds are raised from Old Collegians who purchase Life Membership of the ROCA or from specific fundraising activities organised by the ROCA. WHERE ARE THEY NOW

Tom Donkin ('03)

"At the end of the tour. Tom went to the front desk and asked to speak to the man he had tried to contact for such a long time. At this point, Tom didn't even know if he existed. It turned out he did."

Tom Donkin attended Rostrevor from Year 3 to Year 12 (1994 - 2003), with two brothers ahead of him Henry ('00) and James ('97). After his time at Rostrevor, Tom pursued a double degree in Journalism and International Studies. Upon graduating he took up a job as a newspaper reporter in Berri, enjoying his time in country SA. It was a trying time for that region with severe drought affecting families and farms. He was thrown in at the deep end, but learnt a lot that way.

After six months, Tom was keen to return to the big smoke, Adelaide, for work. But an opportunity came to head overseas when his sister, who was living in Edinburgh at the time, announced she was marrying a Scot. So the entire family started planning a trip to the United Kingdom for their wedding. He left the paper and decided to try to get some work experience out there too. For Tom it was one of those leads you never think will work out. At his sister's wedding, Tom met someone, who knew someone, who knew someone who worked at the BBC in London. Interested, he got her contact details and she in turn put him in touch with the man who was in charge of hiring. Tom eagerly wrote to him. Several times. And got nothing back. Ever!

Hitting a dead end at the BBC, Tom thought it was time to head home. He had done some really interesting work experience in London, learnt a lot and was happy to return home and get a job in Adelaide or the east coast. But before booking a ticket back, Tom saw online that you could do a tour of the BBC and thought "why not take a look at this place". When he walked into that infamous newsroom he was more interested than ever. At the end of the tour. Tom went to the front desk and asked to speak to the man he had tried to contact for such a long time.

At this point, Tom didn't even know if he existed. It turned out he did and that he never responds to people emailing him for work (he gets a few thousand of these a day). He thought Tom turning up at the BBC showed initiative and told him to come back the next morning with his CV, which he did. The rest is history.

For the past six years, Tom has been working there as a producer, a TV reporter, a digital journalist and now, more recently, as a radio presenter on the BBC World Service. He has travelled to incredible places and met some amazing people. He said, "it's a dynamic and innovative organisation, which is also very demanding. You can often work long hours in some pretty tough places but there is a huge commitment to telling stories worth telling. I was there in Berlin when Germany won the last World Cup, speaking to locals and experiencing the euphoria. And recently I was in Sicily meeting migrants who had made the perilous journey from the Middle East and North Africa across the Mediterranean, fleeing war and poverty in search of a new life."

From his time at Rostrevor, which included being Deputy Head Prefect ('03) and Deputy Music Leader of the Music Department ('02/'03), Tom has created many fond memories and connections which continue today.

Tom interviewed Paul Kelly ('71) a couple of years ago for the BBC, who he had played alongside at various Music Nights at Norwood Town Hall, he said that "the concert was the first thing we talked about! I was more nervous with him than for any other interview I had ever done. I am one of his biggest fans and know his entire back catalogue. We spent the first part swapping Rostrevor stories and chatting footy, music and Adelaide. It was an amazing experience, he was glowing about the school and the interview went allthe-better for having this shared experience."



Tom said, "Rostrevor was everything about the early part of my life. I can honestly say that without my ten unforgettable years there, I would not be the person I am today. I look back on my time with gratitude, and nothing but affection for the teachers, friends, opportunities and ideals which shaped and defined those important years of my life."

Dr Jonathon Yong has been on a long and successful journey towards a career as a surgeon since he left Rostrevor in 1996.

In 2013 he became a Fellow of the Royal Australian College of Surgeons. In 2013 and 2014 he gained a Masters in Minimally Invasive Surgery.

Dr Jonathon Yong attended Rostrevor from 1992 to 1996. He achieved many accolades during his time at Rostrevor including Dux of Years 8 to 10 and the Economics Prize in Year 11. Upon graduating Jonathon went to the University of Adelaide where he studied a Bachelor of Medicine and Surgery.

During this time he was also fortunate enough to also spend six months training in the Northern Territory at the Royal Darwin Hospital, where he was exposed to Indigenous Surgery and communities.

Completing his General Surgery Training in 2013, Ionathon was awarded a Fellow of the Royal Australian College of Surgeons. He is currently at the completion of two years of sub specialty surgical training in Colorectal Surgery on the Gold Coast at the Tweed Public Hospital and John Flynn Medical Centre. During this time he has also completed a Masters of Minimally Invasive Surgery through the University of Adelaide (2015).

In 2016 Jonathon will be returning to Adelaide to continue practice in Colorectal Surgery at 142 Ward Street, North Adelaide. One of the head surgeons at that practice who is both nationally and internationally recognized is Professor Peter Hewett, who is also a Rostrevor Old Collegian ('73).





When asked to recall any amusing anecdotes Jonathon quipped,

"I don't like farms or chickens. I still remember having to shovel the chicken pen when I was out of order during Mr Nitschke's Agriculture classes. I only shoveled once because of my own fault and the second and last time was because someone else spoke to me!"

Jonathon still keeps in touch with classmates, Peter Fule, Luke Francis and John Placentino, who is now a close family friend.

When asked about memories of Staff he replied, "I think all the staff I encountered were all special and had a great influence on me. Mrs Meredith was an inspiringly strong woman who was able to give me a sense of calm and confidence in myself during my Year 12 year."

He has over 25 year's experience being admitted to practice in 1979. He was an associate to a Supreme Court Justice before spending the next ten years in general practice, focusing primarily on litigation. Since 1990 he has worked exclusively in the area of personal injury claims.

Peter is currently working at Wallmans Lawyers in Adelaide, specialising in personal injury claims, particularly those arising from motor vehicle and industrial accidents, occupiers liability, product liability and WorkCover. Peter heads up a broad injury practice, with particular expertise in acting in catastrophic claims, total and permanent disability claims and dependency claims. Additionally, he has significant experience with Public Trustee claims.

Regularly representing clients in the Supreme and District Courts Peter has also been involved in a number of matters that have proceeded to the High Court.

John Trainer ('60)

After more than 40 years of serving Adelaide's western suburbs at both a State and Local Government level, Mayor of West Torrens, the Honourable John Trainer was recognised for his contributions to the community with an Order of Australia Medal on the Queen's Birthday Honours List in June 2015.

John commenced at Rostrevor in 1956, initially as a boarder, graduating in 1960. After completing university studies, he started his professional career as a school teacher. His keen interest in social issues and current affairs led to his move into politics in 1979 when he represented the Australia Labor Party as the MP for the seat of Ascot Park and later Walsh, until 1993. During this period he also served two terms as Government Whip from 1982-1985 and1990-1993 and then as Speaker of the South Australian House of Assembly from 1986-1990.

In speaking of his role in public life, John states: "It was during my formative teenage years that President John F Kennedy urged Americans to 'ask not what your country can do for you, but what you can do for your country'. The impression that made on me, in 1960, was reinforced by a passage I encountered in the New Testament during my schooling that reads: 'From those to whom much has been given, much is expected'. Thus, 'the lesson I picked up is that if life has been good to you, then you have a responsibility to give back in some way. Or, as someone else put it: 'If we are not put here to help each other, whatever are we here for?'

John continues "I have derived a huge amount of satisfaction from whenever I can that I am being useful — whether from 14 years as a secondary teacher shaping young lives, serving the Parliament and the State as an MP for 14 years, especially as Speaker, or from the past 15 years as Mayor of West Torrens".

John derived a lot of joy from his schoolteacher days. He adds, "Not a week goes by when I don't have a pleasant encounter with a former student. It has been a real delight to be introduced by them to their children and their grandchildren!

My proudest achievement as an MP was saving the old Glandore Boys Home from demolition to instead become the magnificent Glandore Community Centre where many local residents now participate in activities enhancing their wellbeing".

Like many people there were also some big setbacks in his journey of life, but as one door slammed shut, another always opened. "Unable to continue as an MP in1993 and wondering what I would do with the rest of my life, I was persuaded to run for Mayor. I felt the taxpayers had paid for me to receive a very good political education in the Parliament and I concluded this was one way I could put that to use working for the West Torrens community," says John.

He emphasised that by putting a lot of effort into having West Torrens Council become a quiet achiever that did not attract bad headlines the way some other Councils have given much satisfaction. "This is not easy" he said. Rule number one of political life is 'Whatever you do is going to be wrong'. Someone always thinks you are wrong. You just hope it is not 51 per cent who feel that way"

Initially elected in 2000 by the West Torrens community unopposed, John indicated that not to have any opponent for the next four elections in a row leads one to feel that perhaps "I must have got something right! But after getting so much satisfaction over a lifetime from feeling useful, it does seem strange to then be awarded an OAM for having had a great life. A bit like being rewarded for having had a wonderful time."

But, many might see the acknowledgement as consistent with the College motto 'Palma Merenti'.





Philip Owen ('60)

Philip Owen attended Rostrevor as a boarder from Whyalla, May 1956 to December 1960. He was Prefect in 1959 and 1960 and represented the College in the First XVIII.

The most significant staff member for him was Br Justin Linus Kelty "who was a very impressive man by any standard."

Philip visited him when he was living in retirement in East Melbourne. He told him the story of his defeat at Philip's mother's hands and the way in which he gained entry into the College.

Following some unfortunate incidents in Whyalla involving a scout master, Philip and some other boys, his parents decided to send him to Rostrevor.

Philip said, "my mother rang Br Kelty and told him she was bringing me down to Adelaide to start in Term 2, 1956.

He said that that was not possible because there was no room. She said that she would bring me anyway and hung up on him.

Ten days later I was delivered to the College by my mother and presented to Br Kelty; she made sure that I was fully kitted out in the complete uniform.

Of course, I knew nothing of this at the time."

After leaving Rostrevor Philip did not go straight to tertiary study. He has since worked in almost every state except Queensland and South Australia in a wide variety of jobs including that of taxi driver, a truck driver, a short order cook, a deckhand on Sydney Harbour and a powder monkey. He said, "that life seems to have been a series of accidents, mostly happy ones."

He eventually qualified as a Geologist (RMIT), teacher (DipEd), an Anatomist (BSc, UNSW), a Psychologist (BSc, UNSW and MLitt Hons UNE) plus "a few other bits and pieces".

In Sydney Philip has regularly visited Br Bill Greening who lives in a retirement hospice. Philip said, "Recently I asked him why he was always called 'Ted' by all the students at Rostrevor. He looked at me for a moment and said "Bastard!" and laughed.

I had known the answer before I asked as I remembered his class desk in the old brick classroom building being scratched with the letters 'barsted'. I remember too the amusement we students gained from seeing letters from the Army addressed to 'Captain Edward

Bill is 87 years old and in failing health but is generally cheerful and seems to be well cared for.

Philip also catches up intermittently with Geoff Michels ('60) a boarder from Houghton who now lives in Sydney and Paul O'Neill ('60) a boarder from Port Pirie who now lives in Melbourne. Recently he came by chance (electronically) across Pat Dubois (boarder, Wudinna) who lives in Perth.

Philip concludes, "It is common to complain about one's school days but I am grateful for my mother's steel and for what I gained at the College. I remember many of the staff and students with respect and gratitude."

Anthony Davey ('87) attended Rostrevor College from Year 3, in Miss Nel Cameron's class. Since then Anthony has been dedicated to his career and has worked for over 21 years in Water Treatment Plant design and construction throughout Australia as well as Pakistan, Singapore, Malaysia and New Zealand. In 2014 he was nationally accredited by Engineers Australia as a chartered engineer in Engineering and Management.

During his time at Rostrevor Anthony represented the College in tennis and football and being a family of five children, he is grateful for the assistance his mother received from the Headmaster of the time. Br Kevin McMaster. His older brother Robert ('84) also attended Rostrevor and has gone on to have a successful career as a Professor in medical research at the Texas Bio-medical Research Institute in San Antonia, Texas, USA. He has published numerous research papers on the Ebola virus.

On completion of Year 12 Anthony's entry score for University was lower than expected so he repeated Matric at The Heights in 1988 and won an Art award in Holography with a perfect 20/20. He went on to complete a Chemical Engineering degree at Adelaide University, graduating in 1992 and followed this with a MBA in Technology Management from Deakin University in 2005.

During his time within this industy Anthony has served on the Victorian committee for Australian Water Association as the Treasurer for four years and published over 20 technical papers for Australian Water Association, American Membrane Technology Association and Water and Wastewater Asia.

In 2007 his career further progressed when he commenced as the general manager in his own engineering branch in Preston, Melbourne for Aquatec Maxcon a technology company. Anthony currently supervises a team of 25 professionals, delivering infrastructure to the water authorities with an annual turnover of \$20 million per annum.

He has held previous roles as Technical Manager Water Industry Group/Earth Tech (now AECOM/ Pentair) for five years, and Design Manager for United Group Infrastructure (formerly Thames water) for four, whilst stationed in Malaysia and Singapore. He states that, "the highlight of my career so far has been working on a \$64m recycling project in Singapore, Chestnut Waterworks Singapore, and Public Utility Board."

Anthony has also worked on such projects as Australia's first recycling schemes, as the Design Manager for the Campaspe, Echuca, Rochester Project, which was awarded an Excellence Engineering Award from the Institute of Engineers Australia (IEAust) and the Eastern Irrigation Scheme for Melbourne Water which was gained an International Water Association (IWA) award for innovation in design.

He married Associate Professor Rachel Ann Davey in the Rostrevor College Chapel in 1999. They have two children, Samuel James who is seven and Zoe Ann who is five

When asked about his memories of Rostrevor, Anthony was happy to share.

"I remember playing handball against the Grade 6 building wall before and after school. I also have fond memories of some great school camps, and a kayak adventure down the Murray River in the 1980s, and our trip to Burra in the 1970s. Br McNamara also created some exciting events such as the stage show of 'Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dream-coat', in which I was in the choir. Br McNamara also went onto to encourage our interests in music. He loved 'The Beatles' anthems and was a hard taskmaster, raising the bar and getting us out of our comfort zone in front of an audience. I believe this approach probably got me to challenge myself and apply my talents in life after school.

I remember that in primary school my house front door key happened to fit the lock to the swimming pool change-room. So on a hot day our teacher used to take the class to the pool for a play at lunch-time and we used to use my key to open the pool, to the amusement of others.

There are a few teachers that stood out for me. In Grade 4 Mr. Andrew Evans, and in Grade 6 Mr Andrerw McClean who encouraged my artistic creativity and in Year 9, Mr. J Santini, who encouraged my interests in Science. I fondly remember Brother K.C. McMaster and the exciting stage shows he created for the parents at the Adelaide Festival Theatre.

I do believe that the teachers at the College make the most difference and there are some mentors I am indebted to for encouraging me to use my talents and skills."



The Rostrevor Foundation conduct the Elkin Reilly Appeal to raise awareness for Reconciliation and to raise funds for Indigenous Scholarships.

From a Letter to the Sydney Swans

Between the years 1962 and 1966, in the history of the South Melbourne Football Club, a player by the name of Elkin Reilly was knockruckman for the 'A' Grade.

Elkin is a proud old scholar of Rostrevor College and similarly Rostrevor is very proud of Elkin's lifetime achievements as we are of all our graduates.

Elkin was a student at Rostrevor for six years and he boarded from Minlaton which is on the Yorke Peninsula.

As a student, he was unaware of his aboriginal heritage. When he left school in 1956, his foster father, Dr Pat Reilly, took him back to Alice Springs to discover that part of his life. Through a statutory declaration Elkin discovered that he was taken from his mother at six months of age as had his brother and cousins. Being only six months old he was deemed too young to go to the Telegraph Station and Dr Reilly, the duty doctor at the time, offered to foster him. The police sergeant, who had taken him from his mother, duly obliged the request and Elkin became Julian Elkin Reilly. Dr Reilly and his wife Betty soon moved to Hopetoun in Victoria and then to Minlaton.

Elkin bears no resentment to his foster family as he acknowledges that he was lucky to be brought up by a family that loved him and he recognises the opportunities he was presented – such as an education at Rostrevor College in the 1950s.

In this era of Reconciliation, it is the Christian Brother's wish to acknowledge Reconciliation at Rostrevor College using Elkin as a figurehead – both as a 'stolen child' and an outstanding Rostrevor athlete.

To that end, in 2001, an Appeal is being conducted that will support the naming of a change-room in our new Pavilion to become the 'Elkin Reilly Room'. Supporters of the Appeal will have their name inscribed on a Reconciliation Plaque to be hung in the room.
