YEAR OF PERSONAL BEST

Our school's vision is to provide an authentic and quality Catholic Education for boys in the Edmund Rice tradition. We encourage our boys to strive to achieve their personal best, while aspiring to make a positive difference to the world. There are many pathways to success and we pride ourselves on providing access to the right pathway for every child.

The 2013 results speak for themselves with 37 students in our Year 12 cohort achieving ATAR scores above 90 and 18 Governor's Merit Awards. That equates to 28% of the Year 12 cohort finishing in the top 10% in the State.

Congratulations to the Dux of the College Matt Gibson who achieved a 99.40, closely followed by our Proxime Accessit, Fergus Lynch on 99.30. We are equally proud of our graduates who pursued Vocational Pathways with 14 students undertaking School-based Traineeships and two students receiving an 'Australian Vocational Student of the Year Prize' each worth \$2.000.

We began our 2014 academic year on Tuesday morning, 28th January with our traditional opening ceremony in the Valley. Based on the centrepiece of our Strategic Directions 2014 to 2018, the theme for 2014 is 'Personal Best'.

I want each and every student to strive to be the best that they can be and put in the hard work that will be required to achieve this. I want them to throw off the shackles that limit them, be they internal or external, and set their hearts on exceeding expectations in all aspects of their schooling life. I want every student to finish this year with the satisfaction of knowing they gave their personal best in everything they attempted.

But it takes more than wishful thinking to get there. It takes perseverance, strategy, sacrifice dedication and hard work. I am confident that all our students have these qualities inside them. ACADEMIC RESULTSGRADUATING CLASS OF 2013

At Rostrevor College we encourage and inspire our boys to achieve their personal best as we believe it's the best measure of success. 
I would like to offer my congratulations to the Graduating Class of 2013 on their success in their final year of schooling. At our Dux Assembly on Friday 14^{th} February, we acknowledged their achievements and, in particular, congratulated our Merit Winners and students with ATARs above 90.

- A total of 203 "A" grades were earned over 35 subjects; 25.1%, 4.6% above the Stage Average.
- 98.8% of all grades were either A's, B's or C's (compared to 97% in 2012). Grades awarded for subjects included 24.4% A's, 45.8% B's and 28.6% C's;
- Compared to 2012 grades, there was a significant increase in A's, B's & C's and a corresponding decrease (from 3% to 1.2%) in the number of D & E grades awarded;
- The percentage of A's awarded was 4.6% higher than the State average, the percentage of B's was 2.2% higher than the State average, with a significant drop in the number of C grades where the percentage of C's was 2.1% less than the State average;
- In the first round of Tertiary Course offers, 80% of students were offered courses at various tertiary institutions;
- In 2013 the College offered 34 Year 12 subjects and a total of 44 separate classes, where within 31 of the 44 classes (just over 70% of all classes) nothing less than a C was awarded and 12 classes (just under 30% of all classes) where students were awarded only A's and B's.

These figures should give the Rostrevor community great confidence in the expertise of not just our Year 12 teachers, but all teaching staff, as well as the support services we offer.



Conversely, we should not understate the importance of co-curricular activities at Rostrevor College, which is also a focus of our strategic directions document - both from a participatory angle where our boys are actively involved in sport and the arts, but also the importance of achievement in personal endeavours, the enhancement of this aspect of school life is essential.

Another important personal objective has been to have re-generation at Board level and I was delighted to confirm two new appointments John Kain and Andrew Killey to strengthen our Board for 2014.

Finally, I would like to personally thank our Principal, Simon Dash, and the College Board, including my Deputy Chair, Claudio Galloni, for their outstanding support, dedication and hard work in working towards making Rostrevor an even better school. There have been a number of important changes at the College in recent years, and I am very confident that we have set a strong foundation for the future growth of the College.

JUNIOR YEARS

THE FOUNDATIONS OF LEARNING

Buildings that stand for generations are based on solid foundations. So too a young man's educational future is based on a positive, productive and measured beginning at school. For our boys in the Junior Campus at Rostrevor College this starts with us.

Working Together

We acknowledge that we exist in partnership with the primary educators of the boys in our care – parents and caregivers. Consistent and clear communication about your son/s progress via reports and parent/ teacher interviews is an important part of this stage of schooling. Our primary focus in the early months of schooling is to develop the necessary independence our boys need to begin taking some level of personal responsibility. This is often a continuation of the skills developed in a kindergarten, child care facility or home and it supports explicit teaching of the routines and structures required in an educational environment.

Opportunities to Explore

Our staff believe it is important at this age to focus on the teaching of strategies rather than content as we ready our boys for the spiritual, social, emotional, physical and cognitive aspects of learning. In addition, this early intervention provides opportunities to talk and interact in a structured environment to support the development of language and fine and gross motor skills. With strategies like structured play we aim to provide opportunities for boys to explore their world and connect their prior knowledge, or what they know, to new learning and ways of looking at things.

Building Strong Foundations

To support every boy's learning needs a feature of all classes in the Junior Campus is a strong emphasis on literacy and numeracy development. Educational evidence world-wide supports the notion that boys, in particular, need a strong foundation in literacy and numeracy in order to be able to access curriculum in secondary and tertiary schooling environments.

In the Junior Campus we see a clear link between evidence based phonological awareness approaches and early literacy development. The Phonological Awareness program is used in conjunction with the ongoing nature of processes like the Early Years Assessment and monitoring of reading via running records. Our numeracy programs in the early years also focus on the tactile nature of learning and understanding key concepts like number, space and time.

Holistic Nurturing

We recognise that, for each young man, the learning of new skills may take more or less time than his peers. In recognising this, each of our teachers aims to differentiate learning tasks within the classroom and beyond, so that the varying degrees of ability can be adequately catered for. We are forever indebted to our teachers - this is not easy when 20 boys or more in a class may be at different stages! In addition to strong, evidence based teaching pedagogy (the 'way' we teach) we are also informed by working with a school based speech pathologist, psychologist and counsellor who can all provide expert advice and opinion to holistically support students, staff and families – a model that further acknowledges and highlights the importance of our 'partnership'.

iPAD PROGRAM

Rostrevor has a strong focus on Information Communication Technology literacy that enables students to be successful global citizens in the 21st century. This year, Rostrevor will be providing all students in the Junior Campus with an iPad for school use.

The integration of technology into curriculum is by no means a new concept, however the way technology supports teaching and learning is the key to the program at Rostrevor. By utilising technology based learning tools, such as iPads, students have the capability to research, communicate and present their work in formats that are media-rich, interactive and ultimately, more engaging for the learners. This in turn supports and aligns with the Australian Curriculum where ICT capabilities are integrated across the curriculum in all subject areas.

The increase in student engagement, in turn fosters self-motivation in students' learning and increases their self-efficacy. This nurtures the educational goals of Rostrevor College, which include students being:

- effective communicators
- ${\color{blue} \bullet}$ self-directed life-long learners
- problem solvers
- responsible citizens
- · collaborative workers
- informed thinkers

These goals can be effectively supported and fostered within our Junior Years cohort, and develop a culture of learning with technologies where innovative learning is encouraged and rewarded.

With the use of iPads, a number of changes emerge in the way students interact with their peers and teachers. These include more emphasis on

- collaborative approaches between teachers and students,
- the use of small group activities and the rotation of group through different activities,
- a focus on personalised or independent approaches to student learning.

The use of project oriented tasks that use a clear, multimedia example of the finished product and a flexible, creative way in which to produce this product can result in increased participation and engagement. Using iPads, students can visualise the outcome and feel competent in managing the tools to reach this outcome as they actively seek out the skills needed to fulfill the task.

The iPads for Junior Year students will be pre-configured with all of the tools and apps they will need for their learning. The College will deploy updates and install additional apps as required, negating the need for students to manage their own iTunes account. Added to this, use of the existing infrastructure in the College via the Portal, in particular, Virtual Classrooms, blogs and wikis, will avail a new dimension of communication between students, teachers and parents.

Schools form a basis for the skills and knowledge required by people to succeed in the increasingly global and technology infused 21st century workplaces, and Rostrevor is committed to enabling learners of all abilities to take greater control of their education through the application of ICT in and out of school hours.

WELLBEING

To try at anything is to risk failure, yet we must experience failure, and experience it often in order to be truly successful. The greatest hazard in life is to risk nothing.

"Life is either a daring adventure... or nothing" -Helen Keller

The quote from Helen Keller could be used to describe the life of a young adolescent boy in the Middle Years. Young boys entering the Middle Years are normally full of enthusiasm, energy and a genuine desire to give everything a go. As educators we must not only recognise this but also provide the opportunities for it to flourish.

The Keys to Early Adolescence

A great fear we all have as parents is that our sons, as they grow into their teenage years, will experiment or take risks that are dangerous and likely to cause them or others considerable grief. While this may be a fact of life, so too is the fact that positive risk taking is one of the most important keys to experiencing success.

Positive risk taking involves being prepared to try your best all the time and in all given tasks. These tasks may be inside the classroom, out on the sporting field or when challenged to open up and express their feelings – that can be the scariest risk of all. To try at anything is to risk failure, yet we must experience

failure, and experience it often in order to be truly successful. The greatest hazard in life is to risk nothing.

Nurturing Resilience

This is where another great key comes in -resilience. Young boys must develop resilience, both physical and emotional, in order to be successful. Physical resilience is probably the much easier one. Boys need to be active and the more physically active they are, the more physical resilience they develop. Naturally, things like a good diet and good sleeping patterns help, as well as limiting the time spent in front of a TV, computer or texting on a phone.

Emotional resilience requires much practise and this can come in many forms. Great programs like "Program Achieve" speak of this and give some handy advice when planning activities. It can start with simple things such as stopping to think before speaking. Unfortunately, with the adolescent brain, this can take time!

Trying your best requires practise too. Many boys can give up or throw in the towel if things go against

them. Sticking to the rules when involved in all sorts of activities with other people and not being tempted to cheat, just to win, as well as being tolerant and accepting of others develops emotional resilience.

Accepting Responsibility

Accepting responsibly for all we do and all of our decisions can be difficult at any stage of life, however, again, young boys need this guidance and do not need parents who cover up for them or defend their actions when simple acceptance would do the trick. Adolescent boys need to practise being organised, setting goals and working hard, especially when the going gets tough.

It all sounds quite simple but like all things in life, resilience does not come easily and certainly requires a supportive environment in which to flourish.

REALISING PERSONAL BEST

A culture of independent, open and rigorous academic learning prepares students for tertiary study or immediate entry into the workforce. This is done through a belief that students are equally responsible (if not more) for their own learning. In conjunction with a flexible and adaptable curriculum, strong pastoral care structure and a program that provides expert motivational speakers, all relevant teachings and experience, we help each student achieve his personal best. As a result we maintain high expectations of all students and encourage them to become life-long, self-directed and self-assessing learners.

Academic Program

The Academic Programs offered in the Senior Years serve the needs of a wide range of students. This year we are offering 35 Year 12 subjects and 54 separate classes. 25% of our 2013 Year 12 cohort undertook some type of Vocational Education & Training as part of their SACE which includes Carpentry, Electrical, Automotive, Child Care, Allied Health, Plumbing and other areas of interest like First Aid and Health & Safety.

The start of Semester 2 sees the introduction of Certificate III in Fitness at Rostrevor College. Accredited by AIPT (Australian Institute of Personal Trainers) and delivered by Physical Education Teacher Mr Glen Urbani, on campus, during school hours.

The highest priority is that the individual student's needs are met, be they tertiary aspirations or vocational aspirations. This allows us to ensure that each student is provided with the best opportunity to succeed in their chosen career pathway.

Expert Guidance

Along with our specialist teachers we support our students in numerous ways including our Equity Council which is made up of a number of faculties including Counselling and Psychology services, Adaptive Education, Vocational Education and Training and Indigenous Education. The Equity Council exists to provide and protect the opportunities, success and inclusion of all students into every aspect of a Rostrevor College Education. These services are available to assist students when making realistic assessments of their talents, interests and career options.

Creating Future Leaders

In the Senior Years we initiate these practices at Year 10 level with the introduction of the SACE Board Stage 1 Personal Learning Plan. Students are exposed to representatives of a wide range of professions, careers, and service vocations who speak to them about entry requirements, job availability, job satisfaction and promotional opportunities. With a number of our senior teachers working on the SACE Board as Exam Markers, Chief Examiners and on Subject Advisory Committees. Rostrevor has a fine record of success in SACE Board studies having delivered to our universities and the community, graduates who have become leaders.

OPPORTUNITIES AT ROSTREVOR

Rostrevor provides a number of experiences for our boys to help them understand the various Rites of Passage that they go through. Our western culture does not provide these but what we learn from the strong cultures of the world is that young boys must be given great guidance in order to understand when they will become a man and when this occurs.

These ceremonies involve a journey, storytelling, meal sharing, physical challenges (even some pain to develop resilience and to teach that life isn't easy all the time) and the teaching of life's lessons. This is so that when the return journey is complete, boys know that they are now men and must act accordingly.

Our 2014 days were again a great success. These comments from fathers clearly testify to that:

EDUCATING THE WHOLE BOY





Academic excellence and wellbeing are inextricably linked — students learn best when their wellbeing is optimised, and they develop a strong sense of wellbeing when they experience success in learning.

Student wellbeing is the highest priority at Rostrevor. This includes emotional, physical, spiritual, social and mental wellbeing. Students are encouraged to maintain a healthy balance between their academic studies, recreation and sleep. For some of our Senior boys, this may include part-time work. Students are offered advice on how to balance these through our Pastoral Care Program and for our Senior Years students through our Study Skills Program.

Rostrevor's core business is to provide students with a rich learning environment that is open, respectful, caring and safe. We achieve this by developing and communicating an explicit commitment to wellbeing through our Pastoral Care Program. Our new vertical system incorporates a Buddy Program whereby younger boys can seek advice, assistance and support from older boys in their Pastoral Care class, which consists of students ranging from Years 7 to 12. We deliver an effective Behaviour Education Program applying consistent school-wide rules and consequences that are clearly explained and positively enforced. Through many of the programs offered, we are also able to maintain an environment (physical and cyber) that maximises student safety and wellbeing.

We know that quality classroom teaching has a profound influence on student learning and wellbeing. The curriculum explicitly teaches personal and social capabilities and equips students with the knowledge, skills, attitudes and strategies to understand and manage themselves and their relationships. The manner in which content is delivered (the pedagogy) focuses on building positive relationships between teachers and students and is responsive to the individual needs of students.

Rostrevor College recognises that academic excellence and student wellbeing are not mutually exclusive. We respond to this by ensuring that our programs and practices encourage a positive sense of wellbeing, respectful relationships, engagement in learning and personal best.

SPIRITUALITY







Head, Heart and Heads

Over a hundred years ago, the Australian bishops when faced with each of the Australian colonies passing free, secular and compulsory acts in Education, decided to found a series of schools which recognised spirituality as being important. Hence the Catholic school system began. At the beginning the emphasis was very much on gaining knowledge about faith or religion and teaching that in the mode of the times which was often rote learning. These days we recognise that other factors are also key.

A Catholic Perspective

At Rostrevor we continue to teach boys from Reception to Year 12 about the Christian faith from a Catholic perspective. This knowledge is important because no one can decide in the future about what they believe if they don't know anything. However just knowing about a faith is different from having it touch one's heart. Thus it is essential that boys experience times of prayer, reflection and celebration through liturgy which enables them to express their deepest thoughts and desires. The reflection often comes for the retreats which enable students to drop their masks and show their truest selves. The theologian, Bernard Lonergan, says that we are most spiritual when we are most real. Celebrating key feasts in the Church's season is also important since Jesus showed us through His life on earth how to live.

Living Faith

Of course faith without works is dead, so putting all that is learnt and experienced into action is essential. At different year levels service at home, in the environment and in serving those less fortunate is given to boys to be involved in. In Year 11 all students have the opportunity to spend a week working at a special school, nursing home or on an Edmund Rice Camp, in order to experience the truth that "it is in giving that we receive." Students are also expected to complete fifty hours of community service by the end of the year. Some also take the option of attending an immersion such as the Indian Pilgrimage which can take the experience even deeper. We hope that all of them will go into the world to create a better place for all.

So this Head (knowledge), Heart (Experience) and Hands (Action) approach enables each young man to grow in the spiritual area of his life.

FROM THE ROCA PRESIDENT

Sport

The College has continued its traditions in sport so long established – traditions that have set sport in its proper perspective, as being a means of emotional, physical and social discipline.

Activities

As usual, Mrs Fountain, as pianist, has been indispensable and it would be very difficult to assess the great value she has been to the College over a period of very many years. We are extremely grateful to her.

Old Collegians

The executive members of the Rostrevor Old Collegians have merited for the organisation a high degree of respect and approval. I commend them for the restrained and dignified manner in which their functions are conducted and the true Catholic spirit with which they are imbued.

PETER MULRANEY ('69)



Peter Mulraney was a boarder from Maitland in Year 12, 1969. His two brothers Paul Mulraney ('70) and James Mulraney ('71) were also boarders at Rostrevor.

Peter was a member of the cross country running team that travelled across to St Kevins in 1969, and remembers coming in last. He had a big part in the Therry Society play 'Murder in the Cathedral' and, like everyone else in the senior dormitory, sang in the boarders' choir under the direction of Br Gibbons.

One of Peter's favourite memories is of Br Stanley, emerging from the area that housed the gas fired hot water service for the senior dormitory with smoke trailing from his hair, following a very loud noise. Unfortunately, this was well before the iPhone.

After Rostrevor, he completed a Bachelor of Science degree in Biology and a Graduate Diploma in Education at Flinders University, where he met Toni Pagana (SAC). This led to Peter rounding out his tertiary education with three years of part time study in Italian, so that he could talk with his in-laws. In the mid-1990s, he got the study bug again and completed a Master of Accounting Studies degree at Southern Cross University.

Peter started his working life by spending thirteen years in education, teaching at Norwood and Morialta High Schools (when they were separate schools), CBC and St Mary's. He then worked briefly in the insurance industry, before moving to banking and finance for around ten years. When the new tax system arrived on the scene, he was part of it and travelled around the state telling people how it was supposed to work. In the years since 2000, he has worked as an auditor, project manager and procedure writer for the Australian Taxation Office

Peter as a life member of the Old Collegians Association and a past treasurer of the Rostrevor Foundation remains connected to the College and has since sent his two sons to attend Rostrevor, Francesco ('99) and Thomas ('01).

Peter has talked about writing a book for years. In 2013, after a few false starts, he completed his first novel: After, the first book in the planned Inspector West series. The book explores how Paul Ford comes to terms with the unexpected murder of his wife, and the unearthing of her secrets, as Inspector West investigates her life and death.

WALLY HEARN ('60)

With the recent retirement from the workforce of Wally Hearn Jnr, we thought it appropriate to catch up with Wally Hearn to record his long association with Rostrevor College.

Wally attended Rostrevor from Hectorville in 1960. His father Wally Snr ('37), uncle Mick McMahon, brother Richard ('73) and nephew Richard ('94) (son of Mary) also attended. His nephew Samuel (son of Richard ('73) and Judith) is currently in Year 7. Wally and wife Di also sent their three sons, Tom ('85), Matt ('86) and Lewis ('91) to Rostrevor. Wally and Di were married in the Rostrevor Chapel in 1968.

On leaving school Wally first worked for Port Implements and after with Tom Kinnear Real Estate. He then began what was to be a lifelong career in insurance firstly with South British, Colonial Mutual, Alliance, and concluding with CGU (Rural Section). In his work he and Di moved around the State and at various times lived in Millicent, Tanunda and Kadina before settling back in Adelaide. In recent years he and Di have moved back to Tanunda from their Magill address.

Wally's sporting record whilst a student at Rostrevor is impressive. He played in the 1st XVIII and 1st XI from 1963 to 1966, captaining both teams in his final year. Wally was an allround athlete and represented Rostrevor in the Combined Sports and won two State

Hurdling titles. He was also a College Prefect. His preference for football saw him play Norwood League football before chronic hamstring injuries limited his career. He also played for South Adelaide. He was Vice President of the Millicent Football Club. President of Tanunda FC and coach in 1980. He has maintained a close association with Norwood having worked on the Board there and as Chair of the Recruiting Committee for 9 years. He has been awarded Life Membership of the Norwood Football Club.

Of his time at Rostrevor he remembers Bros, Miller, McCabe, Tobin, Sexton and O'Connor fondly and was well supported by Br McMasters when he was president of the ROCA. During that time he was one of many passionate old boys who fought for the re-instatement of boarding at Rostrevor.

Wally's service to Rostrevor through the Old Collegians' Association has been unparalleled as he became active in the late 1960s, has held the position of President twice and apart from his stints living in the country, has given continuous service to the Old Collegians' committee across those years. The ROCA wish him well in retirement and thank him for a lifetime's service to the Rostrevor community.

Mr Peter Shearer ('81) the Principal of the Catholic Parish school in Clare, played a big part in Zac's life growing up, helping him to cope with the premature death of his father, Bob. It was on Peter's recommendation that Zac's mother. Tina. enrolled her son at Rostrevor. Unfortunately, Rostrevor was not where he wanted to be and he returned to the Clare Valley after a little over a term

His funeral was held in that church at 2.00pm on Wednesday, 12th March and was attended by over 500 friends and family, a testimony to the esteem in which he was held by his peers and the wider community. Rostrevor was represented by a group of ten senior boarders and the Director of Boarding. The funeral mass was celebrated by Fr Paul Fife sj with Emeritus Archbishop Leonard Faulkner, a relation of Zac's, concelebrating.

Peter Dignan ('52)

Well known livestock agent and Old Collegian, Peter Dignan, passed away earlier this year.

Peter spent two years at the College as a boarder from Wilmington. He represented the College in the 1st XVIII as a Year 9 student in 1951, after playing in Br Hec Gurr's undefeated Under 13 team in 1950.

Peter had a long career as a livestock agent with Elders, working in the mid-north and later on the Yorke Peninsula. His stock agent career was interrupted early in his working life with stints as the publican at the Orroroo Hotel and the Kimba Community Hotel.

Rohan Fitzgerald was the eldest son of Gary and Christine Fitzgerald of Kyancutta. He attended Rostrevor as a boarder in 2001 and 2002 and passed away on 2nd February whilst holidaying in Bali. Rohan was just 28 years old when he died but, aware that he had a serious heart condition, he crammed a lifetime of experiences into that short time.

Rohan's funeral was held at the Kyancutta Sports Club on 17th February 2014 and it was estimated that approximately 700 people were present at the funeral and afterwards, at the cemetery and gathering at the Kyancutta Sports Clubrooms.

Rohan was a man who lived his life for others. He loved his family and friends and would do anything for them. He was generous and forgiving. The large gathering of family and friends at his funeral are ample testimony to the high esteem in which he was held. He will be sadly missed by his parents and by his siblings, Tegan, Zac, Tasman and Riley, as well as his many friends.

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
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
