From the Chairperson



Chair of the Board Report Delivered at Presentation Night 24th November 2009

Last week, a newspaper headline shouted "State hands \$2.1billion to non-government schools" ... but guess what? The newspaper wasn't The Advertiser, and the state wasn't South Australia.

And, to be fair, it wasn't \$2.1bn of *new* money. New money in the funding package totaled \$401 million.

Still, described as a record breaking deal, Catholic schools in Victoria will receive an extra \$268 million over the next four years and independent schools, an extra \$133 million. And in a truly ground breaking, and long overdue move, funding for students with disabilities in Victoria's Catholic and Independent schools will be uncapped.

This is big! This is seriously 'wow'

Parents, principals and others in the Victorian Catholic school sector have been calling on their state government for *over a decade* to increase *its* funding for *all* students in Catholic schools. And

finally, the Victorian Government has heard and answered the call ... even in the face of challenging economic times.

In so doing, the Victorian Government has recognised:

The right of parents and families to choose schools that they believe will best meet the needs of their children.

The valuable contribution Catholic and Independent schools make in the provision of educational opportunity and the achievement of quality schooling.

That parents and families have unfairly shouldered increasing responsibility for the costs that come with their decision to choose a Catholic or Independent school education for their children.

The seriously under-whelming news is that, as a result, our state government now invests less in Catholic and Independent school students than any other State government in Australia - and, worse, the level of funding it is providing is declining.

Government funding of schools is a complex, emotional and hotly debated topic. It is one where parents, and the general public, are often misled by mischievous people who conveniently forget to say that you have to *add* together the funds provided by both federal and state governments to get a proper picture.

But consider these facts: South Australian non-government school parents and their wider school communities contribute, on average, 41% of their schools' incomes – in addition to the taxes they pay as individuals.

Private income (basically fees, levies and fundraising) in our non-government schools has risen by 32% over the last 5 years; state government grants to our schools have risen by only 17%.


Students with disabilities in our schools receive significantly less – and I mean *significantly less* – federal and state government funding than students with

of individuals and those of the whole College community can best be advanced and kept in balance'. These key leaders have also publicly acknowledged that in order to bring the College's strategic directions to fruition, they will require:

'... a deep understanding of the educational and spiritual needs of boys, the changing social and educational landscape of the 21st century, and the ways in which the associated challenges can be best integrated given the College's anticipated fiscal and physical resource capacities...'

It is an undeniable fact that families who have chosen to educate their children in South Australia's nongovernment school sector are shouldering an already unacceptable, and growing, cost burden as a result of inadequate and inequitable government funding. This situation cannot, and must not, be allowed to continue.

As an impassioned and long-standing member of both state and national parent organisations, I am committed to continue the fight for funding justice and hope that others will come to see the value of also rallying to the cause.

I thank you for your attention tonight and your support across the year.

I sincerely thank Jeff Croser for his

disabilities in government schools.

Our schools cannot access state government programs that support South Australia's renewable energy goals and other environmental targets.


South Australian non-government schools receive no specific capital works funding from the state government.

I note in this context that while schools, including Rostrevor College, appreciated the federal government's Building the Education Revolution (BER) funds, these were tightly targeted - we couldn't, for example, use them to fund the Board's top priority, the Middle School Re-Development Project - and

they represented a one off gift, not a long-term commitment to invest in nongovernment school infrastructure.

Rostrevor College faces many challenges and harbours many dreams. As Headmaster Jeff Croser will say in his speech tonight, we can not be all things to all people and to this, I would add, we cannot meet all the different needs that our students, our teachers, our parents and our wider community might have.

In planning for the future of the College, the Board, Headmaster and Senior Staff Leadership Team have publicly committed (Strategic Directions, 2009 -2013) to 'be mindful of how the needs

From the Headmaster



I begin by acknowledging the Kaurna people – the traditional custodians of the land on which we meet. I also offer my personal welcome to our invited guests, parents and friends, staff and students.

Last year I told you that the 2008 academic year began well with the biggest number on our student-roll ever and the Stage 2 SSABSA results from the Year 12's of the previous year being the best that we had enjoyed for well over a decade. This year I can stand here and say the same - we continue to have over 1100 boys enrolled and within our Year 12 Stage 2 results from last year, 74% of all grades were either A or B – this is our best academic result for more than 15 years. The two are not unrelated - public confidence in Rostrevor is strong at the moment and there is much for us to be proud of but it all just doesn't happen by itself. We have a great staff team and the tone of the student body, which includes our boarding house, is excellent. Having been in schools a long time and across several, I think I have the perspective necessary to make such comparisons. At the same time, I know that we can not be all things to all people and we acknowledge that we are less than perfect, but that's life too ... no sporting team is perfect, no religious community is perfect and no family is perfect. So one of the big lessons we learn in life is that things don't always go our way and others see the world differently from us, sometimes quite differently. God has

created each of us as individuals with our unique composite of gifts and abilities. So how and why do some schools come together better than others? My aim here is not to detail the wonderful achievements of 2009; this has been well covered in Newsletters, Assemblies and even through our student speakers tonight.

Right from the start I need to say clearly that our religious dimension, our Catholic education and our focus on the Edmund Rice ethos that is rooted in the Gospels and the person of Jesus has a profound influence on everything and on all. We have a basis from which to work; we expect the best of and from one another because of our shared Christian values and principles. When things don't measure up, as they often don't from time to time, we have a foundation from which to rebuild.


But this alone is not enough to make a good school. I think the secret lies in the themes we have had both last year and this. In 2008 we named it as the Year of Connectedness and this year we have the Year of Acceptance.

Firstly, connectedness doesn't happen by itself. To feel connected we obviously need to have something that we are attracted to but we also have to do our bit as well ... we need to decide to engage and funnily enough, we find that the more we engage the greater our sense of connectedness. The same with Acceptance - the more we come to know and understand our self and the more we come to know and understand about others, the greater our sense of acceptance of ourselves and of others. It's related to our attitude. We can choose to remain closed and critical, but by being open and accepting, the world seems to become a better place for ourselves as much as for others.

At Rostrevor, connectedness is for many of our students, strongly related to the pillar of co-curricular



involvement. I often say that the Brothers had it right, from 1923, when they insisted that all boys become involved in these ways because to have boys engaged in activities that they enjoy outside of the classroom generally makes them better students inside the classroom too. They are more connected and they are more likely to feel an integral part of the place – the same with all of us, staff and parents included.

But over-riding this is my belief in the power of teams – I believe in the power of people and getting the right people in the right place at the right time. Rostrevor is therefore running smoothly because we have good teams and good team leaders so much of my thanks for the good that has been experienced this year must be directed to people like Julie Sypek and now Larry Spry and the Junior School Leadership Team and teaching and support staff, to Trevor Coward and the Middle School Planning and Management Team and the middle school staff, to Paul Belton and his team and senior school staff, to Frank Ranaldo and the Faculty Council, to Peter Oswald and his team and staff in Duggan House, to John McCarthy and his valuable team of non-teaching

support staff and to James Kelly and his team of student prefects. I therefore publicly thank all at Rostrevor for their contributions in 2009 and hope that the personal and professional rewards that each have received make up for their generous efforts and significant commitment to the College.

The work undertaken by the Board to develop a Strategic Plan for Rostrevor has been most commendable and will help to position us as a leading centre of educational excellence for all boys' education in the Edmund Rice tradition for many years to come and my thanks to Caz Bosch and all who work with her on this important task. I also offer my thanks to Mark Simpson and consultant Louise Bywaters, who have led the Whole School Development process, which has flowed from the Board's Strategic Plan. A process that has been looking at Rostrevor's culture, the context we find ourselves in today and the consequence of a Junior School, Middle School and Senior School education. From this, early next year, we will have internal committees looking closer at such areas as academic excellence, our pastoral care structures, ICT from Reception to Year 12, how to continually develop student personal responsibility and encouraging increased staff engagement and professional growth. These strategic directions will help us focus and remain true to our College Mission.

But remaining a good school is more than just continuing to be good at what we currently do. In thinking ahead we know that we have three very significant challenges:

21st century child

Writer Cameron Stewart reminds us that the 21st century child is a savvy citizen of the digital age, with a demanding social life and power over the purse strings ... and this is even before he hits high school! If childhood is very different these days, it stands to

reason that it's parents who are learning to adjust as well – maybe schools have a role to play here too ... the 21st century child will have different needs and make different demands on us as teachers and parents.

Counter cultural

We need to continually challenge ourselves to be counter-cultural. Br Philip Pinto, the International Congregational leader of the Christian Brothers reminds us that 'our schools exist to challenge popular beliefs and dominant cultural values, to ask the difficult question, to look at life from the standpoint of the minority, the victim, the outcast, and the stranger. In doing so, we will be giving hope to those who presently have little hope.' St Augustine tells us that we must be better, then the times will be better, for we are the times. Gandhi says it another way ... we must be the change we wish to see in the world. This is, in my eyes, getting harder and is therefore a serious challenge for us all.

The globalisation of the world

The internationalisation of our curriculum and our student population is increasingly important because at the mid-year International Confederation of Principals' Conference, Professor Kishore Mahbubani shared a few of his home truths that rang true for me! The globalisation of western education has

led to the end of 200 years of western domination; when you have the end of western domination of world history we have to start globalising education ... our world is no longer made up of 192 separate boats with international laws to ensure they don't collide but is now moving towards being 192 cabins on the same boat. The next 50 years will see a greater fusion of East and West and this will unleash enormous creativity. What a challenge – this alone let alone emergent technologies, will make the world a very different place in just one generation.

Finally I tip my hat to the current students of Rostrevor; it is they who come up to the standards set by staff and parents and so for their willingness to buy into that which continues to make Rostrevor a great learning environment for boys, I say thank you and may this continue strongly under Paul Belton's leadership in my absence for the early part of 2010. Given that this year has been so successful in terms of bringing home lots of silverware, from music and sport right through to academic achievement, I would like to remind students again that it is not so much about being the best; it's about being our best. This is an important distinction; may we continue to know the difference between the two.

Good night and May God continue to be with us and bless us all.




















Vote of Thanks

























Head of Junior School - Presentation Night Address

Coming back to Rostrevor has been both a challenge, an enjoyment and a life-long ambition of mine. The school has changed in shape, size and operation since my time here as a students in the late 60's and early 70's, but the underlying principles of EREA tradition still prevail into all aspects of the College. The pursuit of academic excellence, the importance of physical activity through sport and co-curricula program and the empowering influence of spirituality still permeate through all aspects of the school.

I believe that the Junior School is at the core of the College, it is the foundation upon which the Rostrevor is built. Hence I will promote, explore opportunities and fight for a strong, sound and well resourced JS. This is vital, not only for the educational teaching and learning program that we want to provide and actively engage the boys in, but also for JS as the 'nurturing ground' for the distinctive aspects that emerge to make a boy a Rostrevor young man.

Education involves the collaboration of people, relationships, communities, processes and structures. This means, that in JS, we must provide an educational program reflecting Edmund Rice traditions.

Nurture and encourage the spirituality of each boy.

Foster a personal relationship with God through Jesus Christ.

ICTs or learning technologies or computers are an integral part of this development. I want to see that all the stakeholders in the JS working together for the same purpose of making the JS the showcase of best practice and learning for all students.

I have come to realize that the key aspects of any successful learning program takes into account that learners have different experiences, knowledge bases and established skills and that we each have our own individual approaches to learning and that its imperative to identify and nurture these and allow time for thinking, adapting and challenging. Learners learn best through an integrated approach to curriculum, this allows for the learning to be relevant and seen as a necessary part of the whole picture and this learning environment must promote positivism and foster a commitment to improving the skills and abilities of all.

Any learning program should have a strong element of 'hands on' leading learners to experiment, risk take and plan for its use in their learning process and have a strong element of fun, enjoyment and achievement.

Effective communication is essential in education. It is fundamental to all learning, both as a part of the learning process and in the publication of the learning taking place.

I endeavor to establish clear and consistent lines of open communication. I actively encourage participation and involvement of all that I work with in decision-making and issues involved in learning or with the job or task that is to be undertaken

My vision for the JS is that – if we believe and promote the 3 pillars of ER tradition of academics, co curricula and spiritual dimension then we to do them and we do them properly – with focus, resource allocation and with passion.

I want to promote innovative ways of operating that will instill futures thinking boys who are proactive in their view of the world and resilient in themselves rather than reactive to situations.

The active working together of teachers, parents and students in the teaching and learning program is a clear priority of mine-developing a respectful and complementary partnership.

I see Rostrevor JS as a showcase for innovative teaching, environmental education in action, and best practice in literacy and numeracy development in boy's education and a spiritual leader within the Catholic community.

I will provide strong leadership, and promote innovative and effective teaching practices to enhance the Vision and Core Business of Rostrevor College, so that all boys achieve success in their learning

I will promote to develop knowledge acquisition and leading-edge practice to improve learning outcomes for all boys.

I will use my experience to motivate and lead staff (in particular, pedagogy, Design and Technology, Futures education, education for Boys and developing teachers identity) in professional dialogue to improve pedagogy and learning practices.





Dylan Reinbrecht was chosen as the player of the carnival, making important


runs, taking wickets and often being brilliant in the field as he led the side with real presence.









We also acknowledge old scholar and longtime staff member at Rostrevor Mr John Ordon who is here in support of the ROCA East African Appeal.

In October, 70 elder Old Collegians gathered for a lunch at the Alma Hotel in what was a very successful and warm reunion of friends from the 20s, 30s, 40s 50s and 60s.

This alternative function to an evening gathering has established itself on the ROCA Reunion calendar.

Other regional reunions this year have been held at Lucindale and Maitland and there have been numerous get togethers of classmates initiated at their level. Shortly I will call upon Br John Ahern to give us a blessing but before I do that I would like to take this opportunity to give you a snapshot of life at Rostrevor College in 2009.

The College has 1137 enrolments from Reception to Year 12.

There are approx 350 students in the Junior School R to 6

and approximately 780 in the Middle and Senior School

There are 150 staff including support staff and grounds staff.

In September work commenced on a \$2m Junior School indoor sports and assembly area courtesy of the Federal Govts. Building the Education Revolution Funding.

Over the last 15 years there has been over \$15m worth of building improvements to the College. The majority of this has been funded by the College.

Over the last 6 years the Rostrevor College Foundation has provided the College with \$1.6m for major and minor works and the Foundation currently holds \$2.5m for future instalments.

The Foundation is heavily reliant on current parents and old scholars in raising its capital to support the College.

The next major building drive will be much needed new classrooms for the Year 7 to Year 9 group, the Middle School.

Academically, Rostrevor results in 2008 where better than or equal to the previous 10 years results with 94% of the graduates being offered a first round tertiary placement. Two Rostrevor students have won the coveted Tennyson Medal for best in the state in English in the last 9 years.

In case you have not heard, the Rostrevor 1st XVIII defeated SHC for the first time in 11 years and then went on to win the State Championship, the first time since 1999. There maybe some reps from that 1999 team here tonight.

The Soccer 1st XI were State Champions this year defeating Underdale High School. The 1st XI Cricket has been the dominant College side for the last ten years taking out the State Championship in 5 of those years and winning the National Christian

Brothers Cup in 2007. This year for the third consecutive year they won the State Messenger Twenty/20 Title defeating PAC.

The College continues to have a broad and successful co-curricular program

Music at the College is at its zenith with the Senior Band winning 2nd and 3rd place in Australia over the last 2 years and winning the South Australian Schools Music Festival over Education Department specialist Music schools in August this year.

Spiritually, Rostrevor has lead the way in South Australian schools with the appointment of a Social Justice Coordinator, 7 years ago.

The College is proud to acknowledge that 2001 graduate, Michael Romeo, entered the seminary in Melbourne early this year after working at Rostrevor over 3 years in Religious Education.

(Introduction of John Ordon who visited the Christian Brother communities in East Africa this year.)

John graduated Rostrevor in 1962.

He has worked on the staff at Rostrevor since the mid 80s. His son Alex attended and was Head Prefect.

The Open Bob Rundle Cup - Who is Bob Rundle?

The Open Handball Cup at Rostrevor is named after old scholar and donor of the Cup, Bob Rundle.

Bob attended CBC in 1944 in Year 3 and in 1948 he attended Rostrevor. He was a keen handballer. He left Rostrevor in 1953 and when the new courts were built he and fellow old scholar, Reg Moriarty, would play Bros Cusack and McCarthy on weekends. When the Intra-school competition was

recommenced (1955) Bob decided to donate the Open Cup.

Bob worked in the family Hotel Broking business for most of his life. He married Ros in 1961. They have three children, Jodie, Mark and Guy (who both attended Rostrevor).

Jodie's son Charlie is in Year 11 at Rostrevor.

Rostrevor's Heritage - Handball

The first mention of handball in the journals of Rostrevor College is in the 1939 Annual on page 48.

A donation was made by the SA Handball Association of £50 towards the first handball court at Rostrevor. The Headmaster of the day, Br McElligot, accepted the donation and in his address, Mr Peter Leahy of the Handball Association, thanked Br Kerwick, the then Principal of Wakefield Street for his support of the association.

In the same edition, on the last page, page 112, there is a list of donors towards the impending handball court at Rostrevor College.

A committee was set-up in 1939, apparently driven by Br Hec Gurr with a view to raising funds for the construction of an Irish Handball court. 1939 marked

Handball Association's Presentation.

Mr. Peter Leahy, president of the S.A. Handball Association, presented Brother McElligott with a cheque for £50, being first donation towards the building of a handball court at Rostrever College. Mr. Leahy stressed the traditional nature of handball in all Brothers' colleges. He briefly reviewed the work of the association, and tendered thanks to Brother Kerwick and past Adelaide Principals for their active co-operation with his association.

Brother McElligott, in acknowledging the magnificent effort of the association, jocularly desired a jubilee every year. He paid tribute to the work of the association, and hoped next year would see the completion of a court at Rostrevor.

Brief references to their schooldays were made, at the president's request, by Hon. W. J. Denny, H. McConville, T. E. Linehan, F. E. McHugh, and F. Kelly.

The musical programme was supplied by Messrs. P. Brien, K. Crispe, G. Flanagan, F. Fairclough, and B. Robb. Community singing was conducted by Mr. J. Ryan.

From the 1938 Annual

I mentioned in Association had donated £50 towards the erection of a handball court here; that sum has since been increased to £65, and Bro. Gurr has given me a like sum contributed by old boys and friends throughout South Australia. The court is nearing completion, and we shall have in the new year splendid facilities for swimming, football, cricket, golf, hockey, and handball.

the Diamond Jubilee (60 years 1879 – 1939) of the Christian Brothers at Wakefield Street.

The first handball court at Rostrevor was eventually built in 1941 but was blown down in a gale a few years later.

The Revival of Handball at Rostrevor

Br Mogg, in the 1950 Annual, refers to the imminent construction of three handball courts. In the 1951 Annual he reports, 'This year our generous friends have subscribed over £1,500 towards three new handball courts, and a start on them will be made as soon as a permit can be obtained. In the 1952 Annual Report he conveys, 'Early in 1953 we hope to proceed with the erection of three handball courts and three extra tennis courts.

HANDBALL.

HANDBALL has become very popular at Rostievor. Some are so keen that they are now known as "the sharks." The standard has gradually been improving all the year, and when the competitions were in progress we witnessed some v stirring struggles, fought out in the best orthodox style.

The handball court is a real boon to the College, and we should not be unmindful of Rev. Brother Gurr's splendid efforts in collecting donations for the establishment of the court. It is now felt that the sporting arrangements are almost complete with this latest development.

It was not until 1955 that Br Mogg re-visited the issue of the handball courts in his Annual address.

'In a few week's time Rostrevor will have the three finest handball courts in the Commonwealth – at a cost of £6,500. When these are completed this College will have unrivalled facilities for every branch of sport.'

In 1956 Br Kelty commented in his Annual address, 'Our own swimming carnival, athletics competition, tennis and handball competitions are just as keenly contested as the interschool tournaments.' And so, a 59 year tradition commenced.

The 1957 Annual reports, 'In the two years since the new courts were built

Rostrevor's Heritage - Handball

Handball has become a major activity at Rostrevor. At all free times the courts are occupied, both with games and with playing 'to the line'. With the latter, twenty or more boys can each take part, and thus it is an ideal way for occupying those periods in between classes and other odd times.

Great interest was taken in this year's championships. Gerald Harrison won the Bob Rundle Cup for the Open Champion from Douglas Pak-Poy and Brian Rodgers.'

The 1958 Annual reported, 'The standard of handball in 1958 was much higher than that of previous years, with many boys participating in this sport of the Brothers. Terry Hodgson eventually won the Open Award after a hard battle with John Gaffney, and thus became the holder of the Bob Rundle Cup'

The 1960 Annual reported that Anthony Brady won the Open Cup and Christopher McCabe the Under 16. At the time of the Annual being printed the other Age group Champions had not been decided. In 1961 The Open Bob Rundle Cup was won by Chris McCabe with Under 16 – Robert Zander, Under 15 - Damien Brennan, and Under 14 - Michael Browne, Under 13 - Phillip Browne, Under 12 - George Reginato and Under 11 - Roland Kosmider.

In 1966, George Reginato was selected for the South Australian Schoolboys team. He defeated Henry Pecanek in the Open final. Henry was Runner-up in the Handball Championships on a number of occasions.

Throughout the 1960s, 70s and 80s, Handball was a dominant internal sport at Rostrevor and was a favourite past-time at Recess and Lunchtime for thousands of boys. The 'line-up' doubles game allowed 12 boys to be active on the three courts at one time and the player who lost the point retired from the court and moved to the end of the line. The nature of this game allowed players of various abilities the chance to stay on the court for an indefinite amount of time.

The boys in the line-up were well served with spectating the game and the usual

banter that goes with large groups of boys eager to enter the playing field. In the 1960s it was not uncommon for a mass sprint from the Rice Wing to the handball courts for 30 or 40 boys, the fastest boys being rewarded with a place on the court or a premium place in the line-up ensuring a turn on the court. During morning recess, it was not uncommon for the slower runners or late-comers to wait in the line for the entire recess time without getting an opportunity on the court. There was little remorse from a boy if this happened as there was enough entertainment spectating or adjudicating the many heated debates on validating flat butts, or line balls or hinders. A hinder was when a player unintentionally (or otherwise) obstructed a player from getting to the ball to complete a shot. Some players became adept at procuring and successfully claiming hinders which prolonged their court time.

The early rounds of the Knockout Age Group Handball Tournaments were also played at recess and lunchtime and provided good spectating and generous amounts of spectator inspired derision, all in good fun, as every boy was a handball aficionado.

The grand-finals of the Age Group tournaments were usually played after school and sometimes on weekends, especially if boarders were involved – as they often were.

The handball courts of the 50s, 60s, and 70s were the television, ipod and computer games of the current era. The courts were a means of gainfully killing time, keeping fit and honing a sense of competition which was a big part of the Brother's means of managing over 200 adolescent boys 24 hours a day.

The boarders owned the courts on weekends as local day boys found out if they endeavoured to use the courts for some practice. Major handball events involved a talented boarder challenging one of the Brothers (all of the Brothers seemed extremely adept in handball with minimum practice). Such events would attract large spectator crowds and, inevitably, the big winner was the

continued respect and esteem the Brothers were held in as they displayed their unique (and seemingly unlikely) sporting prowess on the handball court.

While the Annuals have recorded the Age Champions over the years there is little commentary on the state of the game in the life of the College. This was largely because handball only involved the boys of Christian Brothers Colleges (namely CBC and Rostrevor) and as such did not have the same inter-collegiate profile as the other sports. In 1988, the Annual reports that handball is an "Up and Coming Sport" inferring that its status in the College had been waning.

In that year, 4 students were chosen to represent SA in the National Championships, 3 from Rostrevor: Andrew McCormack, Phil Greco and Charles Sullivan.

Handball was undertaking somewhat of a revival under the guidance of staff member and old scholar Greg Hay. Greg remains active in the Handball Association even today as its President and a regular competitor.

The 1989 Annual featured the heading "Interest has Snowballed" and reported the three handball courts have seen, arguably, more handball than in any other year of their 37 years service. Promising players mentioned were Matt Kelly, Damian Lodge, Paul Harrison and Grantley Fraser. The National Junior team that year was made up of 4 Rostrevor Year 12 students: Tom Farrow, Ben Grave, Tom Walsh and Jeremy Martin.

The 1989 Annual Handball report opens with a quote fro Ron Blair's play 'The Christian Brother' "...when temptations arise do something else. Go and play handball. Handball's great virtue is that it demands such energy that it outpaces the devil. Don't feel that the Brothers don't feel these temptations of the flesh. We're human... That's why we play handball!"

Outstanding players for 1989 were Grantley Fraser and Jim Cormie. Both Grantley and Jim continue to be dominant players in the SA Handball

Association to this day and have gone on to win numerous national singles and doubles titles over the years. Other players to impress of the 50 or so involved in the squad in 1989 were Mark Viscione, Michael Capogreco, Luke Taverner and Luke Darcy with Jeremy Martin captaining the winning internal Handball Pennant team.

Staff member and Handball coordinator of that year, Greg Hay, sustained the literary connection with these closing paragraphs to his Annual article, "There have been many enjoyable moments of Handball this year. Perhaps Ron Blair's words again will act as a summary. They may give some insight into Br Ahern's great love of the game. 'You know boys, don't you, that the worst punishments in Hell are reserved for fallen religious?... You look in after school one day. You'll see a few Brothers whipping the handball. Outpacing the devil, I call it.'

It was another 9 years before Handball got a mention in the Annual again. In 1998 it was reported that Jacob Speed (Boarder, Mildura) and Mark Fitzgerald (Boarder, Kimba) won the Senior and Middle School Handball Trophies, respectively. The revival of Handball can be attributed to the dedication of Br John Ahern who was pro-active in arranging competition with CBC and an alliance with the SA Handball Association for whom he was a player. In 1999 there was a squad of 10 who played CBC regularly on Friday afternoons in Term One and Four. The Christian Brothers Cup was inaugurated at this time. The competiton was an after school program between Rostrevor and CBC Wakefield Street. Luke Rogers won the Senior Handball Trophy and an Australian


Doubles title with a player from CBC. Henry Crawford won the Middle School Trophy and Luke Reynolds and Clayton Oldfield represented the State. In 2000, Luke Reynolds won the Senior Handball Award and represented the State as an Under 18 and won the State Junior Singles and Doubles Championship.

Handball continued to grow as an interschool competition and in 2003 fifteen boys represented the College against CBC. Jesse Orlando and Vincent Tarzia won the Middle and Senior School titles respectively. Vincent, along with Gary Binning and Joshua Hocking represented SA at the Nationals in Sydney.

Br Ahern continued the tradition of Handball through 2004 and 2005 and he reported in 2005 that Handball had undertaken a small revival with the 'signing up' of new players from Years 7 and 8 Rostrevor won the Christian Brothers Cup in 04 with CBC winning it in 05. Paul Easton won the Medal as best player in the Cup. Rhys Stringer and Jesse Orlando won the Middle and Senior Trophies respectively.







My brother Barry and I commenced at Rostrevor in 1952 after attending St Therese's school in Colonel Light Gardens. I commenced in Grade 5 while Barry was in 1st Year. Br (Charlie) Mogg was the Headmaster at the time. Life was so exciting with so much sport on offer after a famine in the convent school.

I was fortunate to be in sporting teams from Year 6 onwards. In my last year (Intermediate) I was awarded the MV Condon Gold Medal as I competed in five Open 1sts teams - cricket, football, tennis, athletics and rifle shooting. At the time, being awarded this medal was controversial, as I was only in Intermediate (Year 10). In later years I learned that Br Bourke stood up for me when others on staff felt that a more senior student should receive such a medal - even though they represented in fewer sports. Academically I was distracted by all the sport but was still able to manage studies well.

I can still recall vividly our gym classes with Mr Hubble and Mr Blewitt. We could do wonders when the cane was wielded and that was often! Who could forget quarter time in the Underage footy games when we slipped down to the remnants of the old orchard for an orange or two. The celebration of our first Olympian, Peter Papps, (Peter was selected in the Pistol Shooting Rapid Fire Team Ed.) in the gully, was also a memorable occasion.


In the primary school we just loved to get out of class to roll the wickets and didn't we stall our return to the classroom! Embarrassingly I can recall a student, who remains nameless, collapsing his desk in 1st Year (Year 8) by deliberately loosening the bolts in order to enliven the boring English class (with 90 + students in the one class). After being turfed out of class, he ended up pelting a few ripe olives through the louvres into the classroom, much to the amusement of students and the annoyance of Br Gifford. The recalcitrant student ended up scott-free didn't he - he was the captain of the 13A footy team of which Br Gifford was coach! Just imagine what would have happened today if he had done that! Our choirmaster, Peanuts, had us all singing well but dead scared of being called out for a touch-up if we lost attention. Br O'Donoghue (Peanuts) knew how to get the best out of his choir and we did enjoy performing. I can still recall the shock of Wick (Br Kerwick), during a training session for the interschool athletics, producing his strap to assist me over the high jump bar - cleared it with

All the Brothers had nicknames such as Peanuts, Mad-mack, Bruiser, Moggie, Spud and Wick.

I can still recall with affection Brother Mogg who taught me in Year Seven and the Year Six teacher who was a breath of fresh air after the very strict regime we

had in Year Five. Overall I/we had great respect for the Brothers who all spent much time getting the best out of us all in the classroom and on the sporting field.

After completing Intermediate I left to become a Christian Brother and studied further in Melbourne before being appointed to schools in Hobart and Melbourne. I left the Brothers in 1965 and took up a teaching post at Sacred

Altschwager Heart College in Somerton Park until I left for Canada in '67 to teach and hopefully join the professional tennis circuit. I met my wife, Trish in a small town in Alberta, came home briefly to be married in Brisbane then returned for more teaching, tennis coaching and snow skiing - to which I became addicted. By this time I realized I needed to settle down, so more study at the University of Calgary followed and I abandoned hope of joining the tennis circuit. Australia, family, warmth and beach summonsed me home in '72. Fortuitously I was offered a teaching position at St Paul's College, Bellambi, so we traveled home from Vancouver by ship and settled into Woonoona Heights (Wollongong) where we had our first son. I was offered a lecturing position in Brisbane (1975) and also a Head of Department position at Nudgee College so we headed north where I/we have since then happily lived.

We have two daughters and two sons – two sons are overseas while the daughters remain here in Brisbane. I have in turn been teacher, education consultant and principal with Brisbane Catholic Education. 

Peter Tunbridge

A recent visitor to Rostrevor was Peter Tunbridge and his wife Jenny.

Peter was keen to see developments at the College over the last 45 years.

Peter Tunbridge attended Rostrevor College from Term Three 1960 until the end of 1963 as a boarder from Woomera and in 1964 as a day student. Peter was the beneficiary of his parish priest's generosity who paid his school fees to allow him to attend a Catholic High School.

His brother Jeffrey also attended.

Peter was a member of the victorious Combined Sports team in 1963 as a walker.

On leaving Rostrevor he worked in Adelaide at the Savings Bank of South Australia as a clerk, but left after 18 months and joined the Royal Australian Navy. In the RAN he became a radar system technician. Leaving the RAN, with further study (Studied Electronic Engineering in 1973-75) he became a Radio Technical Officer in the Department of Civil Aviation, working in the Radio and Computer systems used in controlling aircraft within Queensland. He worked at Brisbane, Mt. Isa, Longreach and Cairns Air Traffic Control Centres and studied Computer Science in 1993-95.

On leaving Airservices Australia (prev Dept Civil Aviation) in 1999, he has

worked as a System Administrator in Brisbane. In 2004, he retired and has since worked casually as a communications technician and as a solar power installation technician.

In mid 1971 he married Jenny (a Queensland lass) and they have lived and worked in Queensland, mainly in Cairns. They have 3 daughters, and 6 grandchildren.

When asked of his recollections of the Brothers who worked at Rostrevor during his years here, Peter was more than generous with his time in contributing the following memories and anecdotes.

"My memories of the Brothers at Rostrevor is that they were tough taskmasters, stern disciplinarians, very able and capable and mostly good men. I saw the Brothers toil at all sorts of work outside the classroom, tending ovals, sports grounds, the swimming pool, gymnasium, coaching sports teams. They expected us students to be good all-rounders; we were expected to take part in cricket, football, swimming, athletics, dancing, singing, elocution, musical appreciation and cadets.

During my time, the principals were Br Kelty then Br. O'Sullivan.

Br. O'Connor. I remember him as an elderly, kindly, gentleman. One memory of him that I have is the day he explained to us Year 8 students that crude oil supplies would one day be exhausted! He was the supervisor of the refectory and the dispenser of pocket money. We would get our pocket money from him on Saturdays, in time for a trip into Adelaide CBD (with his consent), or a hike into Morialta Falls Park (also with his consent). I remember him looking the other way on the day when our boarding house table tried to set the world record for the number of Weetbix eaten at one sitting. I remember the pre-grace jostling for the heated milk, and the apricot jam, horseshoe rolls and fritz for lunch every day.

Br. McCabe. As soon as I began my time at Rostrevor, I was assigned to the soprano section of the school choir. Under Br. McCabe's firm and unrelenting hand, we learned to sing the majestic Alleluia (Handel's Messiah), a beautiful song "Deep is the Night" (Chopin's Tristesse?) and another quite beautiful song, "Romany Roving" (Brahms Hungarian Dance?). We also learned some other musical pieces that slowly took shape as Gilbert and Sullivan's "Trial by Jury". I really had no idea what was going on, I just did as I was told and had a lot of fun along the way. Then on speech night, I found myself on the stage with a full choir facing the quiet but expectant audience. A bloke walked upon the stage and took his place at the organ, then started playing the Alleluia. The choir started on the

conductor's cue (Br McCabe) and I was amazed. Every chorister rose to the occasion and sung their hearts out. The Governor, in the front row, stood for the "Alleluia", as did every member of the audience. I discovered a great joy and pleasure from standing in the middle of a great choral power and of listening to an organ in cathedrals and halls. The performance was stunning. An hour later, dressed as one of the maidens I sang in the operetta "Trial by Jury." This was also a wonderful experience. I have never forgotten it. I have enjoyed a lifelong love of choral singing as a result of this wonderful experience.

Br. McMaster. As a boarder in 1961, I lived in the then new brick (Rice Wing) wing close to the Reformatory. Br McMaster was in charge of our

dormitory. He was a warm, helpful and friendly man who calmly soothed the fears and troubles of our group of 12/13/14 year old boys, subdued our unruly behaviour with firmness and pulled us back into line as needed. I remember "getting the bomb" from him one Saturday morning after running up and down the rear stairs (20 treads with a platform halfway) in 4 steps. Several of us were engaged in some sort of a competition.

Br Faulkner. He taught us chemistry, physics and religion. One recollection I have of him is while teaching the refraction of light, explaining how increasing carbon dioxide in the air would cause air density to rise causing a green house effect that could bring about a rise in temperature on the earth. Amazing stuff for 1963. We

called him George, but I don't remember why. We put a sparrow in his briefcase one lunchtime, in the hope that it would fly out when he opened it at the start of the lesson. When the briefcase was opened, the sparrow didn't fly out, and after a few minutes, when Br Faulkner realized that not many of us had done the previous night's homework, he flung a text book into his open briefcase, and killed the bird. This was not my finest hour. On Saturday mornings, George would lead a band of boys around the College doing maintenance work. He also taught us religion and perhaps Latin. I recently found the Knox Bible from my schooldays, with my handwritten notes in the margins of Paul's Epistles. I was quite taken by the fact that we were taught analysis of Paul's Epistles when the mainstream

church was very unscriptural. These Christian Brothers were very much ahead of the times.

Br. Miller. Known as "Stickman," he was a maths teacher. He was about 15 feet tall, a smoker, and not to be trifled with. We lived in fear of him and we hung off his every word. He would sometimes remove his habit to administer the "bomb," and had a low tolerance of failure. He had a system where he would suddenly stop talking and the next student was expected to supply the missing word. He took a very dim view if the next person didn't or couldn't supply the appropriate word. This was his way of forcing students to pay close attention to him, and to know their maths formulae. He expected us to have a tiny spirax formula book, divided into 4 sections (arithmetic, geometry, algebra and trig) with formulae written into it and learned. A dog frequented the College grounds in the early 1960s, he was called Fleabag and Br. Miller was quite fond of him. He would be pacing across the front of the classroom proving how $(\sin 2x + \cos 2x)$ equals 1, would spy Fleabag outside and, mid sentence, would continue walking right outside the classroom, lovingly pat Fleabag, then walk back into the classroom and continue on, right where he had left off. 40 years later, in Brisbane, I was describing Br. Miller to a friend and mimicking his monotone voice, "You bloody rat bag son." The friend asked, "Was it a Br. Miller?" My friend had also been taught maths by Br. Miller in Brisbane, and described similar experiences to mine. He was a very hard man, but had some innate sense where he knew whether a student was a low achiever or a poor achiever, and made allowances where necessary. I always marveled at his sense of justice.

Br. Tobin. I remember this man being shy and retiring and overseeing our homework sessions at night, where he seemed to be quietly omniscient. He was an occasional swimming coach. His hair was arranged in a push back style, and we all reckoned that this was the result of him having travelled from Perth to Adelaide on a motor bike. This was before the days of helmets!

Mr Mills was a kind, gentle man who taught us English and French. I was always taken by his love of poetry, and language. While I have never warmed to poetry, Shakespeare or Thomas Hardy, I do have an appreciation that there is a beauty lurking somewhere within literature, thanks to Mr Mills and the Brothers. I remember being an actor in a French play that Mr Mills produced for an inter-school competition. I had an uncontrollable fit

of the giggles during the performance, and was ashamed of myself, but Mr Mills seemed unfazed when we didn't win, he just made suggestions as to how we could improve next year's performance.

Tom Kendall was the archetypical rugged athletics (coercer) coach who inspired all Rostrevor's budding athletes. He looked tough with his ruddy complexion and broken nose and he was tough. He inspired the likes of Ron Hooglandt, Jim Ramsay and Graham Haskell. The Combined Sports Day at the Adelaide Oval was a great day, with Rostrevor usually doing very well. I came into his dominion for

a year or so as a walker.

I have come to realize the great appreciation that Australian Society owes the Christian Brothers. Sure, a very few of them caused great harm to a few, but most of them have worked long, hard and cheerfully to educate and form good young men to serve Australia well. It is a sadness to me that the broad contribution of the Christian Brothers to Australia goes largely unrecognized, while the sins of their few are over recognised. Their unseen influence has spread far and wide in all states of Australia. I am proud to have been associated with them."


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

"I commenced at Rostrevor College in 1947 as a boarder at the age of 10. The reason for boarding at that time was that my father Carlo was building the road from Freeling to Gawler and when the road was complete my parents returned to Adelaide and I became a day boy.

My father had purchased a house on Montacute Road in 1942 which is now occupied by one of my children. It took 20 minutes to walk to school through cow paddocks with only one old house in sight, where John Harrison lived and John and I walked to school together most days. (John is the elder brother of Gerry and Denis Harrison)

In 1953 I became a boarder again, my father was unhappy with my Intermediate results.

"You are too interested in sport", he said, and he was right.

All Italians had to be able to play the piano-accordian, and I was no different.

Br Mogg would let me practice in the living room (current-day Gold Room) of the White House, which was, and still is, a magnificent room.

I was a member of Br Gurr's Under13's Football and Cricket teams, both teams were undefeated in 1950. To commemorate this achievement we were taken to the cinema to see 'Take me out to the Ball Game'. Another highlight was being selected in the 1952 First Eighteen and kicking a goal with my first kick. I can still recall how nervous I was, it was a mongrel kick but it went through for a goal. I played in the First Eighteen in 1953 as well.

In late 1947 my father purchased a quarry in Horsnell's Gully at Magill. He wanted me to continue at school, but I didn't. He handed me an 18lb sledge hammer, and said "When school starts after Christmas you might change your mind."

He migrated to Australia in 1926 with nothing, only a suit case. He was a very hard man. However, I did not change my mind and did not return to school and had to crack these oversize rocks for the next 12months. (I became very fit)

After the year was over, I went to the School of Mines at the University on North Terrace to qualify as a Quarry Manager, which I achieved in 1957.

In 1975 I was admitted as a Member of the Institute of Quarrying and in 1980 a Fellow of the Institute of Quarrying.

In 1960 my father, myself and my brother Lino decided to enter into the pre-mix concrete industry and our company was known as Strong Mix Concrete. We were pioneers in this field of operating a quarry and producing pre-mixed concrete. The daily production was 2,500 tonnes. Dad passed away in 1985

In 1990 we received an offer from a multi-national company we could not refuse and moved into real estate investment, particularly in the CBD.

The Goolwa Shopping Centre which has been expanded recently on land which was purchased in 1964, is in our Real Estate portfolio.

On January 9th 1960, I married Angela Beltrame who is **Gino Beltrame's** sister, Gino also attended Rostrevor. We were married in the Rostrevor College Chapel. We celebrated our 50th Wedding Anniversary on the 9th January 2010 with Mass and entertained family and friends in the afternoon in the Rostrevor Pavilion.

We have had four children, Selina, Sonia, Carl and Denis, both Carl and Denis went to Rostrevor. Our two son-inlaws, Ted Piteo and Andrew Moffa also went to Rostrevor and were married in the Rostrevor Chapel. Ted married Selina they have two sons Daniel and Justin who went to Rostrevor. Andrew married Sonia and they have three girls who have attended Loreto.

Carl has a son who is 5 years old and will later go to Rostrevor and Denis has a son who is two years old and will go to Rostrevor.

I have kept in touch with the old boys by attending the Black Tie Annual Dinner for many years, and more recently the lunches at the Alma Hotel. I also attend two annual luncheon's with approximately 20 old boys who went to school in the same grades at Rostrevor. Some of those who attend are: Ted Buckler, Michael and Des Shanahan, Alec Haddad, Creagh O'Connor and Brian Byrne.

I have always followed the Norwood Football Club and in 1973 I became involved in the fund-raising committee at the NFC. In 1978 I was elected to the Football Club Committee and in 1981 to the Board and the following year became Chairman and President of the Norwood Football Club. I held this position for the next 15 years. In 1990 I was fortunate enough to be elected to the inaugural SANFL Commission and retired in 2006, a position I also held for 15 years. I was a strong believer in succession planning and made way for Brian Cunningham to take my seat. There were many challenges in my term of office, but not as great as now. I have many friends from all SANFL Clubs and from the Crows and Port Power I would never have been able to spend all these 30 years in football administration without the support of my wife Angie.

Rostrevor is a great College and as you grow older the more you appreciate what the Brothers did for you. They really had the vocation and the passion to instill into all those they taught the qualities to grow up to be good citizens and role models for young people. We owe a lot to all the Brothers of that era. The Brothers that taught me were: Br Gurr, Br Fogarty, Br O'Sullivan, Br McMahon and Br Kerwick. Br Mogg taught me English in Intermediate. For me, they all had their particular strengths. I have no problems with all the Brothers that taught me.

However, I had a soft spot for Br Kerwick probably because he was the First Eighteen coach and selected the side. He would take aside the ones in the


following week's side to explain the tactics for the next Saturday's game, which meant of coarse we would miss the lessons that afternoon.



Mark (Shads) Shadiac attended Rostrevor from Durant Avenue from 1970 to 1973. His older brother Paul ('70) and younger brother John (1970 - 1973) also attended. Mark spent his early school years at St Joseph's Tranmere and then attended St Ignatius before choosing the shorter trip up from Durant Avenue. Mark was familiar with the Rostrevor culture long before he attended as a student. Like many of the local boys in the district, the College grounds were part of his backyard as many in the neighbourhood friendship group either attended Rostrevor or were prospective attendees. Rostrevor family names like Coligan, Coughlin, Sheedy, Shirley, Busch, Konopka and McBride were regular frequenters of the College grounds and facilities. They developed a healthy respect for Br Miller long before they attended.

Mark represented the College in Football, Cricket and Athletics, at the highest level and won the Open Athletics (Fr Robert Rice) Trophy in 1973. He is quick to point out that Richard Hearn, a classmate, and possibly the best schoolboys' athlete to come out of Rostrevor, was away at the National Championships in Canberra for that Sports Day which enabled him to take the honours. Richard still holds some Rostrevor hurdles and sprints records. Mark also was awarded the 1st XVIII Most Improved Trophy (The Br Kerwick Memorial Trophy donated by Dan Clifford).

On completion of Year 12 he studied to become a teacher.

Mark takes up the story, 'After career counseling, I decided to become a teacher. My career counseling was a session in the old theatre where we had to fill in what courses we planned to study prior to the Matriculation exams. I was sitting next to Michael Burke and he said, "Why don't you become a teacher because you get heaps of holidays". With a rationale like that, how could I refuse? I did a Diploma of Teaching at Murray Park CAE and followed up with a Grad Dip in Educational Counselling at SA Institute of SA. I then followed up with a Bachelor of Education at Salisbury CAE and finished with a Masters of Education at University of SA."

After completing his initial degree Mark ventured to Perth with a mate from Teacher's College and he worked there for two years at Mazenod College, Lesmurdie and played football for Claremont FC in the WAFL. On his return to Adelaide he was lucky enough to gain employment at Blackfriars' Priory School, Prospect. During his time there the Head of the School suggested to him that he apply for a Principal's position.

"They were obviously desperate at the time and I was appointed to St Brigid's Primary at Evanston. After nine years of travel to Gawler, I moved to St Francis Xavier's Regional School at Wynn Vale and spent 14 years there. After 23 years as a Principal, I decided I needed a sea change and resigned from Catholic Education and spent a few months working around the house and playing golf."

In 2004 Mark won the role as CEO of the South Australian Amateur Football League. In the last 5 years, under his guidance, the SAAFL has evolved into an extremely progressive League and competition. Possibly the most significant undertaking has been the relocation of the SAAFL to Thebarton Oval which in time will allow the SAAFL to establish a traditional headquarters with a home ground. Developments in

website technology, sponsorship, day to day operations and match day operations have all been achieved under Mark's guidance. He has had a significant impact on the progress and direction of the League and while this has not been achieved without healthy debate the long term advantages of his vision are now being enjoyed at the Club level in many ways.

Mark married Erica in 1979 in the Rostrevor Chapel and they have three daughters, Kate, Kirsty and Holly.

Mark has remained very close to the College in many ways. He served on the Old Collegians' Committee during his University years and after returning from WA, he played football and cricket for ROCS.

"In cricket, I initially played in the B grade with the likes of Tim Ryan, Chris Sargent, Dave Pozza, Greg Bourke, Brian Clancey, Michael Vinci and Mark Clota. We had an infamous show at Michael Vinci's after one of our grand finals and needless to say the recovery session took longer than the game itself."

He then had a break from cricket but


was coaxed back into the game by Creagh O'Connor Snr (former ACB chairman) in the team known as the Invitation XI.

Mark recalls, "The team consisted of "gentleman" the likes of David Smith, Leon McEvoy, Roger Wasley, Jack Bailey, Dick Cranwell, David Pozza, Mick McManus (Aquinas old boy who trained in the WA squad with Dennis Lillee), Chris Sargent and a few old Ignatians like Chris Mellows and Rob Richards. David, Jack and Dick were clearly gentleman but as for the others, they were in the renegade category at best. We had a fabulous seven or so years and won about 4 Premierships along the way. The emphasis was very social and nothing was undertaken in half measures."


In 1980, he returned to playing football at ROCS with Peter Vivian as coach.

Peter's Thursday night training sessions were memorable, "After a few laps of circle work he would say 'that'll do for tonight, don't want to take the edge off you for Saturday.' His method worked well as we played and won the A4 premiership in 1980 with the likes of

Peter (Spike) Gava kicking 7 goals from centre half forward. David Clancey was the captain and we had the younger brigade of Peter Beltrame, Creagh O'Connor (Jnr), Tim Jordan, Mick Sandery and the older crew of Craig Peters, Bocka Bowler and a host of others that escape me. I finished playing at the end of the 1987 season after ROCS had climbed their way into A1. In 1984, we lost the grand final in A3 to Port District by 2 points in a nail biter, then made amends in 1986 when we defeated boiling hot favourites Scotch OC in a

memorable game."

Mark was A Grade Best and Fairest at ROCS in 1984 and won two ROCFC Joseph Teisseire Memorial Shield Umpires Best and Fairest in 1980 and 1984.

When asked to recall any amusing anecdotes of his years at Rostrevor Mark was well equipped with recollections,


"Where do I start with the anecdotes? I could write a book on them. It would be fair to say that trouble and Shadiac were synonymous and there are a number of

people I have to thank, including my mentor, Martin Whyte, the likes of Phil Leggett, Horse Ryan, Paul Blackwell, John (Boxhead) Williams, Damien Ryan, Greg Neck, Richard Nutt, Peter Hamden and Terry Lange in my early years and in the latter years, Shane Cavanagh, Paul Bowler, Mick Deegan and even Barney Pedlar, although badged as a goody too shoes.


When asked if he still keeps in touch with schoolmates Mark replied,



Paul De Sciscio



Paul De Sciscio ('04)

Paul De Sciscio, 22, commenced Rostrevor College in 1999 as a Year 7 student. Paul graduated with merit in 2004. Thereafter, he studied a Bachelor of Health Sciences at the University of Adelaide and graduate with Honours in 2008. Currently, Paul is enrolled in the 4-year Graduate-entry Medical program at Flinders University.

Throughout his undergraduate degree Paul has been extensively involved in clinical research in the field of cardiology. He has received scholarships from the National Heart Foundation in 2007, the Royal Adelaide Hospital Research Fund in 2008, and the Cardiac Society of Australia and New Zealand in 2009. Paul has presented research at a number of international cardiology conferences, including the prestigious American College of Cardiology Scientific Meeting (attendance: 44,000 delegates). In August 2009, Paul received perhaps the highest honour in Australian Cardiology and Cardiovascular research being awarded the Young Investigator Award by the Cardiac Society of Australia and New Zealand (story below).

Paul has only just begun his academic career. He continues to manage his time between medical school and clinical research as he strives towards a future in cardiac surgery.

Medical Student Awarded one of the most Prestigious Awards in Australian Cardiology and Cardiac Surgery

On Saturday the 15th of August 2009, Paul De Sciscio was awarded the Ralph Reader Prize (Clinical Young Investigator Award) of the Cardiac Society of Australia and New Zealand. He became the youngest winner of this award and the first medical student to achieve this honour. The Ralph Reader award is considered one of the most prestigious awards in Australian cardiology and cardiac surgery.

The Ralph Reader Prize was initiated in 1980 as the Young Investigators Award of the Cardiac Society of Australia and New Zealand. The Prize was renamed the Ralph Reader Prize in 1981, after the distinguished Director of the National Heart Foundation from 1961-70 and thereafter the Director and Chief Executive from 1970 until his retirement in 1980. The first "Ralph Reader Prize" was held at the 1982 Annual Scientific Meeting in Melbourne and was awarded to Dr Rob Dennis of Westmead Hospital.

On the 14th of August 2009, Paul De Sciscio presented his research titled 'Localised High-Density Activation Mapping of Dominant Frequency Sites during Atrial Fibrillation in Humans' in the opening session of the 57th Annual Scientific Meeting to an audience of 2,300 delegates. At the Annual General Meeting on the 15th of August, Paul was awarded the Ralph Reader Clinical Prize and became the youngest and first medical student to achieve this honour. Previously, the youngest documented winner was Dr Richmond Jeremy who was 28 when he won the Prize in 1984. Dr Jeremy went on to become the Secretary and Treasurer of the Society and is currently the Editor in Chief of the Society's Journal, Heart Lung and Circulation

The first South Australian to receive the prize was in 2000 when the Basic Science Prize was awarded to Dr Peter Sage of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for his presentation "Mechanisms of impairment of vascular responsiveness to organic nitrates". The second South Australian to be awarded the Ralph Reader Prize (also in the Basic Science Section) was Dr Carmine De Pasquale of the Flinders Medical Centre in 2003 for his presentation "Chronic heart failure increases bi-directional protein movement across the alveolocapillary barrier". Paul De Sciscio is the first South Australian to receive the Ralph Reader Prize in the Clinical Section and the first representative of the Royal Adelaide Hospital to receive the award.

This year Michele commenced post-graduate medicine at Flinders University, which has meant putting his PhD on hold, however he is eager to complete his research in the future whilst pursuing a career in Medicine.


The January 16th 'Advertiser' headline read 'Sun rises on Twighlight hunk's sexy new status.' The ROCA is sure Xavier can handle that!

Gerald Ward ('40) commenced at Rostrevor in 1935 and left in 1940.

ALD—completed their Law courses together within the past twelve months, and are together in the family's legal firm. Kevin is remembered for his sporting prowess and gymnastic ability during his years at Rostrevor (1933-740).

Thank you Chairman,

It is my great pleasure to propose Creagh O'Connor for Honorary Life Membership of the SACA. It is an honour not lightly bestowed by the SACA and, in fact, at the moment there are only 11 living Hon. Life Members which includes the widows of two deceased Hon. Life Members

Creagh's contribution to SACA and Australian cricket has been outstanding.

He joined the SACA as a member on the 1 September 1953 – so he is rather old! He has been on the Board of Management from 1991 to the present. He has served on numerous SACA subcommittees during his time on the Board but his unique contribution to SACA has been through his engineering expertise gained over a long career in the engineering and construction industry in Australia, Middle East and the USA. In particular he was incredibly valuable to the SACA over the lights' issue when the first lights didn't work and he led the successful mediation of the dispute with Baulderstone which left SACA not being out of pocket.

He was also instrumental in the building of the Chappell and the Clem Hill Stands which were both delivered on time and under budget and of course he is heavily involved with the current rebuilding of the western grandstand and hopefully he can repeat his good work.

His Cricket Australia involvement - Creagh was a Director from 1998-2008. He was Cricket Australia Deputy Chairman from 2004 & 2005, Cricket Australia Chairman 2005-2008. He served and chaired on numerous subcommittees of Cricket Australia.

ICC - He was a Director of the ICC Executive Board and the IDI Board from 2005-2008. The other commitments have included being a Trustee of the Les Favell Foundation, a Governor of the Bradman Memorial Fund later the Bowral Museum, a former Director of the Kerry Packer Cricket Foundation which distributes funds to underprivileged cricketers and former players and officials who have fallen on hard times and he is a past Chairman of the Lords Taverners South Australian Branch. In 2008, in recognition of his contribution to cricket, he was made an Honorary Life Member of the MCC at Lords.

His playing career - Creagh played cricket from an early age until well into his 50's and maybe I'm being kind there! He played grade cricket with Kensington and also with the Western Australian Club Floreat where he lived and worked for some years. He also played Adelaide turf cricket for many years with Edwardstown Cricket Club and Rostrevor Old Collegians' Cricket Club and in fact he was turning out for Lords Taverners until recently.

Apart from Creagh's SACA involvement, Creagh has served Australian cricket with distinction. As I said the Chairman for three years. During this time he was successful in forging and strengthening Australia's international cricket relationships. Most people don't realise the huge workload the Chairman of Cricket Australia takes on in terms of time, travel and management and has complex issues working in a culturally diverse environment – and I am learning all about that. Creagh did this whilst

suffering for a period of almost 18 months with a chronic back injury which necessitated him at one stage in October 2007 having to stand rather than sit for a two day ICC Board Meeting in Dubai. Then having to be evacuated home from Dubai at the end of the meeting.

Creagh is highly regarded throughout the world of cricket and despite the fact that Australia argues points of strong principle at the ICC Board table, it is a tribute to his diplomacy that he can argue a point, but retain the other party as a friend. He treats world cricket leaders of all backgrounds with great respect and this is reciprocated.

Creagh's diplomacy and standing in world cricket has made my job as Cricket Australia Chairman much easier and I would like to personally thank Creagh for the time he took to tutor me in the role as Cricket Australia Chairman when I was Deputy.

I think he is a truly deserving recipient of the honour of Honorary Life Membership of SACA and I would ask John Bannon to second the motion.

The motion was seconded and carried with acclamation.

Additional Honour

Additional to that honour on, Saturday 5th December 2009, before play commenced in the Test on the Adelaide Oval, Creagh was presented with a gold medal on which the inscription reads "In recognition of outstanding contribution to cricket". The honour marked the centenary of the International Cricket Council.

Creagh's connection with Rostrevor has been well documented in other editions of the Red&Black

(also, see page 46 and 47 this edition).

What has not been elaborated on is his family connection as a third generation Rostrevor family.

Creagh and brother Henry attended Rostrevor in the 1950s. In 1954, Creagh's father donated the statue of St Joseph which graces the front lawns of Rostrevor House.

Creagh sent his three sons to Rostrevor: Andrew, Creagh (Jnr) and Tim.

They in turn have sent their sons to Rostrevor: Andrew and Charles and Thomas, George and William respectively.

Andrew Jnr has recently made his mark with the ROCFC as both an A Grade and B Grade player and won the 2009 George Franzon Memorial Best and Fairest Trophy.

Creagh also served on the Foundation Board in its infancy (from 1987) and along with the other old scholar visionaries associated with the Foundation at that time, helped establish a strong financial platform for future developments at Rostrevor.

The ROCA congratulate Creagh on his Honorary Life Membership of the SACA and his acknowledgement by the International Cricket Council.

Christian Brother Jubilarians

On January 19th in the College Chapel a celebratory Mass was held to recognise the lives and work of Bros Ray O'Donohue, John Moylan and Michael Coughlin in the service of God and the ethos of Blessed Edmund Ignatius Rice.

Raymond Richard O'Donoghue

When my mother died on Christmas Eve 1929, my father became mother and father to 6 children under the age of 14 years. He lost his house, his job, his car and spent his time bringing us up on the dole (30 shillings a week). As the only girl in the family died in 1931, we were an all-male family, very fortunate to have all the love we needed from our father.

Although we lived in the days of the Depression, we did not feel deprived or depressed; we shared the ups and downs. In a house without electricity, gas, bathroom, laundry and a reliable water supply, there was time to enjoy songs from Allan's Songbook, comics, Sunday roast cooked by Dad. We even had bread, jam and cream on Sunday evenings. Windfalls on the Murray River orchards brought bags of apples, a Toc H man brought us blankets in winter and the S.A. Govt supplied me with a free issue of Longman's Latin Grammar. I did not feel demeaned by having to collect

horse manure around the streets so that I could sell a little cartful of fertiliser for sixpence to go to the 'flicks' on Saturday. Cutting up the "Advertiser" newspaper provided the toilet paper without any embarrassment

Brother Regis Bloom enrolled me and my brother at CBC Wakefield St, free of fees. Br Dorotheus Murtagh hid some money for my lunch when he saw I sometimes had none. From him I gained an entrance to the world of music. I suppose I owe my vocation to the care of my father and to the Brothers of CBC and to Br Justus Smith when he came fishing for men to join the Congregation. In the Juniorate, I learned the study, prayer and living habits which have supported my vocation.

On the Mission, my life followed the usual pattern. After 6 months in CBC Lewishham in 1944, I went to Mackay (4 years), Townsville (2), Rostrevor (4), CBC Adelaide (8), Whyalla (6) and then about 30 years in Western Australia in Kalgoorlie, Leederville, Geraldton, Fremantle, Highgate, Collie, Kununurra.

The five years spent in the East Kimberley gave me some time at the margins of the Gibson Desert visiting places like Halls Creek, Ringer Soak, Billiluna, Lake Gregory to help with computer education for Aborigines. This was followed in my 70th year by the seven years in China where I enjoyed the Internationality of trying to live the Gospel among long-suffering people. While the first 15 years of my life bring the gentlest of memories, the past 15 taught me some much needed empathy for people great and small.

John Moylan

Before I joined the Brothers at 14 years of age in January 1950, I lived all my life in Prospect where my life revolved around my family, my prayers, Rosary parish, especially the altar boys, a large number of friendly Protestant neighbourhood boys, football and cricket, and the North Adelaide Football and Prospect Cricket Clubs.

After five years of training in Strathfield and Minto in NSW, my active life as a brother began at St Joseph's College North Melbourne. There I commenced six years of part time accountancy studies which culminated in my becoming a fully qualified accountant. I did not have a chance to use this degree in teaching senior secondary work until many years later.

Three years later I began football coaching with the Under 10s, 11s, 12s, 13s and 14s at St Patrick's Fitzroy. The period of more than four years there was marked by my conducting both the Year 5 and Year 6 choirs each year in the

Christian Brothers' Eisteddfod finalised in the Melbourne Town Hall. Each year one of these two choirs was the winner and the other the runner-up, but we never achieved the double. Both the boys and I developed a great love of Gregorian Chant and hymnody as a result of requirements for participation in this eisteddfod.

I was rushed to St Edmund's Collie when a Brother left there unexpectedly and had nearly three years there. There it took sometime to adjust in this lonely community after the excitement of living in the action-packed city of Melbourne with plenty of vibrant, cheerful young Brothers around. However, the people and boys of Collie turned out to be marvellous once I got to know them, and together with the other two Brothers in the community helped make Collie memorable experience.

In 1965 I was changed to Rostrevor and was there for seven years. I loved it there. The Brothers were friendly, humorous characters and, in the early part of these years, in particular, the boys' lives reflected their devotion to their faith. This was shown, for example, among much else, by daily voluntary individual visits to the Chapel, and devotion to the Mass and to Our Lady. This pride in their faith was most visible among the boarders who lived in during the term.

Then to Aquinas in WA for a year where I taught 320 boys each week, some of them in only two short periods weekly, for the Year 10 Achievement Certificate. The following year, while at CBC Fremantle, I began a part-time Arts degree at the University of WA, which was completed at the University of Adelaide in 1978.

My second period of eleven years at Rostrevor commenced in 1974. I gave a football to the Pope during this time, did a Roman Tertianship, and led a pilgrimage to Lourdes, Waterford and Rome.

More recent years have included stints at St Paul's, Fordham University (USA), CBC Adelaide, Australian Catholic University, Thebarton and West Beach. I am returning to Chavagnes International College in January where I have been for most of the last seven years.

Michael Coughlin

I was born the third child of John Coughlin and Joan Mylius. I grew up in a family of five boys and my sister was born shortly before I joined the Christian Brothers. I grew up in Payneham and attended St Joseph's Memorial School at Norwood. In Year 3 we moved to Magill and I transferred to St Joseph's School, Tranmere. I began my secondary schooling in Year Eight at Rostrevor College.

On completion of Year 11, I joined the Juniorate at Bundoora in Victoria in 1960 to complete Year Twelve. In the following year I commenced my Novitiate. On completion of my Primary School teacher training, I began my teaching as a Brother at Trinity College in Perth in 1964. I began part-time university study and continued this when I moved to CBC Adelaide in 1970. I consider that some of my motivation to this vocation was influenced by some of the Christian Brothers who taught me at Rostrevor College.

I learned much from my experience at

Trinity College especially from the Brothers with whom I lived, the lay staff, parents and old scholars. I enjoyed helping boys develop their talents especially in sport and singing.

While at CBC I was able to assist with the introduction of an innovative educational program called Integrated Studies. I continued with sporting and musical activities and completed my university studies.

In 1976 I commenced teaching at Rostrevor College. It was here that I began teaching senior students. I taught Ancient History and English. I gained valuable knowledge from my fellow Brothers and lay teachers. I continued to assist with sporting activities and I spent considerable time in athletics coaching.

In 1979 I commenced a university course to gain qualifications to move into counselling.

In 1983 I moved to Thebarton to help establish an Intentional Community for young men who wished to explore their interest in a religious vocation. I completed the Counselling course and in 1987 I moved to St Paul's College where I spent nearly twenty years mostly in Counselling. I have fond memories of the many students, families and staff with whom I worked during those years.

In 1989 I assisted with establishing Edmund Rice Camps in South Australia. I continue my association with Camps mainly as a cook. I am passionate about the wonderful work that Edmund Rice Camps does for all who are involved.

I have enjoyed two sabbatical periods in Ireland, learning about the birthplace and other centres that are associated with Edmund Rice.

Presently I live in the Brothers
Community at Magill. I help in the
Indigenous Academy at Rostrevor College
and I continue coaching boys in Athletics.
God has blessed me immensely through
my family, the Christian Brothers,
students and the many people who have
befriended me along the way.

Peter Phillips, a Rostrevor Old Scholar, has been honoured by Pope Benedict, having recently been appointed a Knight Commander of the Order of St. Gregory the Great. The award especially honours his contribution to the Catholic Military Ordinariate (Australian Defence Force Diocese).

The Catholic Bishop to the Australian Defence Force, Bishop Max Davis AM said: "General Phillips has always been a strong supporter of Catholic Chaplains and has an outstanding reputation of an edifying Catholic life. This was true from the first moment he joined the Australian Army and continued through his various command and staff appointments. We would recall his friendship with Bishop Morgan and his tremendous support to my venerable predecessor of happy memory in a number of ways. Clearly his spirit of service was not limited to things 'Catholic' and he remains significantly involved in (at last count) 13 community support activities. We all recall that, at one stage, he was the National President of the RSL."

Peter said that he felt deeply honoured to receive the award from His Holiness. "I would like to think that the award honours the men and women of the Australian Defence Force and the ex-service members and families who help 'keep the Faith in the Forces'". He expressed gratitude to Bishop Davis for the opportunity to work with his Diocesan Finance Council and the chaplains. "Sadly", he said, "we do not have enough chaplains to minister to our Catholic servicemen and women but the situation is much improved, especially since the Knights of the Southern Cross conducted a national prayer campaign for vocations last year".

Peter was born in Burra, South Australia, on 4 June 1935 and educated by the Josephites and the Christian Brothers at CBC Wakefield Street and Rostrevor College (1947-51).

Peter entered the Royal Military College, Duntroon, in 1952. His 40-year military career included active service in the Malayan Emergency in 1957-59, where he commanded a Tracker Team, and as a company commander in South Vietnam in 1967-68, where he was awarded the Military Cross. He went on to command 3rd Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, and later Queensland Military District. His final military appointment was as Assistant Chief of the Army (for Personnel) and for this service he was made an Officer of the Order of Australia in 1989.

Peter Phillips has been a member of the Catholic Bishops' advisory committee on migration and refugees since 2004; and chairman of the finance council of the Catholic Military Diocese since 2005.

Peter married Rosemary Martin in the Rostrevor College Chapel in 1961. They have five adult children and several grandchildren. They have lived in Canberra and been members of the Holy Trinity Parish community since 1971. They also share a passion for golf and family history.

Since the early 1970s, the Christian Brothers have endeavoured to bolster the culture and tradition of the College with the employment of lay old scholars. Old scholar Christian Brothers have added exceptional value to the progress of the College through the work of Br John Bourke ('27) over four decades (on the staff in the late 1940s, mid 1950s and mid 1970s) and Br John Marks ('50) who returned as Headmaster in 1979 to 1983. In the early 1970s old scholar lay staff were employed for the first time with the employment of Paul Urban and John McInnes. Since then there has been a solid representation of old scholars on the Staff each year.

In 2010 there are 21 old scholars or partners of old scholars on the staff and this article is a first in a series that endeavours to sketch a profile on each.

John Ahern CFC

John joined the Rostrevor College staff in 1988 as Deputy Head (Admin) after a period in Western Australia. After a study break in 1993 and 1994 he returned to Rostrevor as Director of Spirituality and has been Acting Headmaster in 2004 and 2007 for short periods of time. He attended Rostrevor from 1960 to 1967 before completing Year 12 at the Brothers Juniorate in Victoria. His brothers, Michael, David, Stephen and Philip all followed him to Rostrevor. In his final year at the College he won the History and the Purton Oratory prizes. He studied for his teaching degree in Victoria and completed his Bachelor of Arts at Adelaide University while teaching at CBC in the 70's. He was awarded a Master of Arts degree in 1994 from Boston College in the United States.

His career in education has seen him teach at CBC Adelaide, be Associate Principal at St Mark's Bedford in Perth and foundation Principal of John Paul College Kalgoorlie. His recent work at Rostrevor has been rewarding as it has allowed him to contribute to the Ethos of the College very directly. He has enjoyed interacting with students as a teacher of English and most recently in Religious Education and Retreat work. 


